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

"ONCE UPON A TIME"

Tony Harpur writes excellent blogs on numerous subjects and his one on East Cork & Irish History, Ancestry & Heritage is special. Tony worked in Limerick for fourteen years but he has now returned to his native Midleton to pursue new opportunities. When in Limerick he also served as a week-end Docent, a volunteer guide / researcher, at the Hunt Museum and this led him to pursue an MA in the history of Art & Architecture. He was awarded a Certificate in Continuing Professional Education (Geology) in 2015, following a course conducted by the Irish Ancestry Research Centre. His research interests include history, especially local history, genealogy and family history, architectural history and art history. He says that the best birthday present that he ever received was a membership card for his local library! His blog relative to Glounthaune is most interesting; "Many Irish villages have origins lost in the mists of time but some are very clearly the result of someone's decision to create a village in a particular spot. This is the case with Glounthaune which is located about nine or ten kilometres east of Cork. Until recently all traffic for Midleton, Youghal, Waterford and Rosslare had to go via Glounthaune but the completion of the dual carriageway from Dunkettle to Midleton put an end to that. Traffic bypasses Glounthaune now and this allows it to slip into a new existence as a very desirable commuter village. The local community has set up a series of sign boards to illustrate and explain the history of the village which was only created in 1810 by the Falkiner family of Annemount, a local "big house". When I say "village" you must remember that it was a really small place. Firstly, Riggs Falkiner, then MP for Clonakilty and later MP for Castlemartyr, had a quay built in 1780 for the extraction of local stone and importation of coal. This quay extends some distance out into the waters of the inner reaches of Cork Harbour to ensure that vessels would not ground on the mud banks. The local parish priest, Fr. Murtagh Keane, had a chapel built there in 1803 at a cost of five or six hundred pounds. A village began to grow up around the guay and the chapel but in 1819 the local landlord, Sir William Falkiner, had some "superior dwellings" erected in New Glanmire to create a planned village laid out in a T-plan. Sir William's dwellings were given some of the highest valuations for ordinary houses by the Griffith Valuation; the houses or cottages were valued at £3.10 which was very high compared to the national average of £1.00. In the 1830s the village got a National School which by 1837 catered for some two hundred and fifty pupils. A new school building was erected in the village in 1901 which happily is still in use, but as a Community Centre, and the current National School is now located on high ground overlooking the village. In the meantime vast changes had taken place that affected not only the topography of the village, but also its transport links. The creation of the village led to the making of a new road on the shoreline to link Cork to Midleton and Youghal. However the only access to this road from Cork was still by way of the bridge in Glanmire. Up to this point the only route to the east from Cork was by boat, as Arthur Young experienced in the 1770s, or via the upper road from Glanmire which ran along the crest of the hills above New Glanmire. This road passed over what is popularly known as the "Dry Bridge", or Lackenroe Bridge. The bridge was constructed in 1811 by Sir Samuel Falkiner to provide a smooth road from his house at Annemount, overlooking Glounthaune, to Cork on one side and Midleton and Youghal on the other side. The ordinary people at the time didn't understand the word "viaduct" so the bridge was given its popular name. It still stands as one of the most famous features of the village.



The bridge also allowed the creation of a proper paved road down the steep hill to "New Glanmire", probably replacing an old trackway. The Lackenroe Bridge is still a landmark in Glounthaune and causes headaches for truck drivers who don't realise that their trucks might just get caught under the bridge. The most important changes came about in the late 1850s when the Cork to Youghal railway was built along the shoreline. The embankment to carry the track smoothened out the shoreline and created a series of "ponds" on the landward side. The line from Dunkettle to Midleton was completed by November 10th.1859 and reached Youghal by May 1861. By that time the Cork & Youghal Railway Company had been amalgamated with the Great Southern & Western Railway, which proceeded to build the line linking Glounthaune to Queenstown (now Cobh) by 1862. In 1896 the line from Glounthaune to Youghal, via Carrigtwohill, Midleton and Killeagh was downgraded to a branch line, with the Queenstown line being upgraded to a main line. This was the route that so many Irish emigrants took to meet their passage to North America. The railway halt at Glounthaune was initially called New Glanmire Junction, and then it became Queenstown Junction in 1866, Cobh Junction in 1925 and finally became Glounthaune Station in 1994. With the final closure of the line from Glounthaune to Midleton and Youghal in 1978; Glounthaune became a mere suburban halt on the Cobh line. But the reopening of the rail link with Midleton in 2009 made Glounthaune a busy spot again since it was now possible to travel by rail from Midleton to Cobh and Fota Wildlife Park! One effect of the building of the railway was the demolition of the chapel built in 1803 and its replacement by a new building designed by George Coppinger Ashlin which was open in 1898. Ashlin recycled his design for the church at Ballyhooley for the church at Glounthaune, although it seems likely that the parish priest at the time specifically asked for this design. The Sacred Heart Church remains the

most distinctive monument viewed as one passes the village today. The original village was cut off by the railway line and a bridge was built to link it to the new road on the northern side of the railway. The church stands directly opposite the bridge, close to the site of the original chapel of 1803. One claim to fame that Glounthaune has is the rich planting of trees, especially conifers, from all over the world but especially from the west coast of North America at times the place feels like parts of North California. These trees and other shrubs were planted by the occupants of the "big houses" such as Annemount and Ashbourne. Ashbourne House was the home of Richard Beamish in the late nineteenth century and he used the railway halt directly opposite his house for importing specimen plants for his gardens. No doubt the denizens of Fota did the same with their very own railway halt! Richard Beamish, scion of the brewing family that made up one half of the Cork brewers Beamish & Crawford, was recognised for his contribution to propagating plants when a poppy was named for him; Meconopsis Beamishii. With its sheltered position and sunny southern aspect; it is no wonder that Glounthaune became a favourite habitat for wonderful specimen plants from the late 1800s. Ashbourne was later acquired by the Hallinan family who ran the Avoncore Mills in Midleton, formerly Hackett's Distillery. The Hallinans' employed some of their mill workers to develop the gardens at Ashbourne; given that their mill was close to the railway at Midleton it was easy for such workers to get to Ashbourne to work there. The Hallinans' kept up the gardens and one would love to know what additions were made by them, but eventually they sold Ashbourne in the 1960s. It appears that the auctioneer removed some of the more valuable plants to Dublin before the sale of the house! The development of the house into a hotel secured its future, with the gardens being carefully maintained throughout these years. Sadly the closure of the hotel in the year 2000 and its current use as an asylum seekers reception centre means that the gardens are not properly maintained. The good news is that the grounds are listed for protection, so there's hope for restoring them!" Well, the foregoing was developed with care and presented in detail and features information which heretofore has not been referenced. For example; Tony's advice that the railway halt at Glounthaune was initially called "New Glanmire Junction", and noteworthy also is the fact that the design of Glounthaune church is similar to the one at Ballyhooly. The church there, in the parish of Castletownroche, was dedicated in 1870 which was twenty eight years prior to the one at Glounthaune. Ashlin designed both and it is interesting to note it was likely that the then parish priest of Glounthaune requested the similar design.



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NO SUCH THING AS A MAINTENANCE FREE GARDEN



This meticulous small front garden may look easy to maintain but just the opposite is the case. It takes time and effort to have the lawn, the neat shrubs and flowers all looking as if they were attended to on a daily basis. Visitors and passer's by will notice all, even to the upkeep of the property itself.

There are only two kinds of garden-yours and other people's. The garden that you are responsible for is the real one. It has your imprint, your choice of plants and total input in every respect, up to and including that chore many call 'maintenance'. However, the more I garden and the more I visit gardens, the more convinced I become that there is no such thing as a garden which is 'maintenance free'. Being multi-dimensional, maintenance really does matter, and the slow process of managing takes time and effort, even for those with tiny plots, who we may sometimes envy.

Maintenance, or the lack of it, is highly visible. It shows and it cannot be hidden. It is not confined to plants alone or how often the grass is cut. The way a garden is presented, I feel, counts in the end far more than an expensive layout or the choicest of plants ever could. Within the boundaries of your property, tidiness around the dwelling and on other hard landscaped areas is vital if you want to create a memorable first impression for visitors. Don't think for a moment that visitors won't notice your entrance gates whatever condition they may be

in, whether or not you have a house nameplate, or even the way the drive is paved. They will. It extends to the décor of the property along with any nearby outhouses. That's apart, as I have said, from any lack of maintenance to trees, shrubs, and border plants, the quality of the lawn or how it is edged. In the end of course the visitor is more likely to take a keen interest in your plant content and how you managed and maintain them!

But all gardeners I feel really do try to set high standards (and most succeed) and this is what makes going to other people's gardens so enjoyable! You can make comparisons, find inspiration, and notice how things can be done, or shouldn't be done. There's an absurd enjoyment in comparing someone else's plants (and garden surrounds) to your own, and of not being obliged to understand why the lawn or flower beds have not been set in a style and fashion after your own. The best thing of all about garden visiting is that your own garden never looks so good as it does when you've just got back from looking at someone's else's!

And yet, adopting high standards is not the real answer to successful gardening,

fungus or phytophtora. This last named fungal disorder (which attacks grisellinia and other hedging varieties) is pronounced fi-toff-tora. Blackening of the roots and at the base of plants are sure signs of attack. There is no chemical cure for this. Peel back the bark from the thicker roots and look for a white fungus and black strands-honey

it's in knowing what you can get away with it that counts! Once mid-summer has passed, tidying and cutting back becomes critical if the garden is not going to take on that middle-aged spread appearance. By August, clumps of catmint for example can be sheared to remove faded blooms thus allowing the plant to put out some welcome fresh growth. Siberian iris which flowered in June can be dramatically reduced, so too early-flowering hemerocallis, lady's mantle (before it seeds everywhere) untidy-looking fennel, all violas, faded rose blooms, even the tatty and badly-holed leaves of slug-eaten hostas. Never ever be downhearted by failures, they happen to everyone and they're rarely permanent. Try that rose again, or the wisteria, scented daphne 'Jacqueline Postil' or the latest in perennial Salvias which need no watering or supports. Always look ahead, never backwards. Forward planners and forestallers of disaster will always have the best borders as the seasons come and go like the tides. When their work is finished, they wash their hands and pray, for the glory of the garden that it may not pass away too quickly.

fungus. There's no cure either for this so remove diseased plants and burn. Fungal disorders are not always to blame for hedge losses. Sometimes when you remove a suspect plant, check to see if the roots are constricted and coiled which may indicate that the plant failed to establish in the first place. To prevent this happening again,

THE JULY GARDEN

SUMMER: is the season of light. Generous amounts of sunshine now fall from the heavens and none more so than in very recent days. That touch of fire invited all growing things to leap into immediate fullness, and first to respond were the agapanthus which opened fully in shades of milky blue, with the darker forms following in quick succession. And then there are the pristine white forms. How magnificent these as they sway on their long flexible stems in the brightness as if welcoming delicious autumn!

Summer may inherit spring's passionate urge for growth but this year its early start was stolen due to cold nights and low light levels. Only now is the vegetation maturing into a deeper green growing thick and sturdy on shrubs and ornamentals. Flowers too are responding and their show will surely delight for another two months if not more.

ROSE BALLING: is a condition where rose buds not alone look slimy but they fail to open. Normally, when wet weather is followed by sun, the fused outer petals may dry out and scorch into a tight shell that prevents the buds from opening. To counteract this, water the base of the plants rather than over the foliage, remove balled buds promptly before secondary rot sets in, and try to increase ventilation (and air movement) by removing a few inner branches.

ADD A FEW SPARKLERS: to the summer border by sourcing sunshine yellow rudbeckias, red hot pokers, hot coloured penstemons and any of the glorious salvias which adore bright dry conditions. If blue is your colour rather than yellows and red, then introduce one or two tall Aconitum carmichaelii for this simply throbs in the autumn light. Excellent alternatives for August and later include the low growing, wonderful Aster 'Little Carlow' or Aster Calliope. These will escort you into autumn and come back to visit and delight year after year.

tease out the roots before planting. In fact all plants should have the root system at the base of the plant teased out gently before planting. As ever, laurel is best cut with secateurs to avoid chopping leaves in half and producing a tattered, untidy appearance.



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



Know Your Rights - July 2016

Question: My child is almost three years old and has a disability. Will he be able to access the free Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) year?

Answer:

Yes, he will. A new programme – the Access and Inclusion Model (AIM) – was launched on 15 June 2016 for enrolments in September 2016. AIM ensures that supports are available for children with special needs so they can fully benefit from the free pre-school year in mainstream pre-schools.

AIM is a child-centred model, involving seven levels of progressive support which offer tailored, practical supports based on the needs of the child and the preschool provider. It does not require a formal diagnosis of disability.

Levels 1–3 provide universal supports designed to promote and support an inclusive culture in pre-schools. If a pre-school provider and a parent think that additional support may be needed to meet the needs of a particular child, they can apply for additional targeted supports under levels 4–7 of the model. These targeted supports include expert early childhood care and educational advice and mentoring (level 4), specialised equipment, appliances and minor alterations (level 5), therapeutic supports (level 6) or additional capitation to fund extra assistance in the ECCE pre-school room (level 7). You access AIM supports through your pre-school service provider. If you have not identified a suitable preschool for your child, your local City or County Childcare Committee will be able to help you. When you have identified a pre-school for your child, your service provider will consider, in consultation with you, what supports may be needed to ensure that your child can participate fully in pre-school. Applications for supports under AIM are made by the service provider wil the Pobal website. Pobal are the current administrators of the ECCE programme so your service provider will be familiar with the Pobal website. The application process is now open and will remain open throughout the year.

The eye:

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The human eye is a wonderful structure, allowing us to perceive our world in glorious technicolour. Cornea Our eves work in the brightest sunlight, and yet allow us to see even on Iris the darkest night. Pupil We have two eyes, spaced slightly apart. It is this that allows us to perceive movement and judge speed and distance. Very sensitive nerves transmit signals from the back of the eye to the brain. The clear front of the eye is the cornea, which allows the light penetrate. The coloured part of the eye is the iris, with the pupil in the centre. There is a flexible lens within the eye, focusing the light on the retina at the back of the eye. The eyelids protect the eye, while keeping it moist, by distributing the tears across the surface of the eye.

Tears are not simply water, but actually a really complex 3 part layer, with an oily surface, a watery middle and mucus base layer. The oily surface helps stop evaporation of the tears. We produce tears when upset, but also in response to bright light, winds or dusty environments. Optometrists are highly skilled in diagnosis and management of eye disorders, with a 4 year university degree in eyes. We are very fortunate to have an optometrist recently established in Glanmire. Cathal O'Shea is a local, having attended both primary and secondary school in Glanmire. He trained in Dublin and Cambridge and brings a wealth of expertise back to Glanmire. Check out his website at http://glanmireopticians.ie/ He is also trained in hearing problems, but for this article we're concentrating on eye problems. I'd encourage you to drop in and check out his new premises in Crestfield, Glanmire. He will advise in more detail on the conditions I describe

Human Eye Anatomy

Common eye problems:

Eye problems can arise from disorders anywhere along the pathway above: from eyelids, cornea, tears, lens, retina to name some. I intend to address some common eye disorders in this and the subsequent article. I'll start with an issue affecting babies,





Tear duct blockage in babies: We produce quite a lot of tears to keep the surface of the eye moist. Our tears ultimately drain into a small channel, the tear duct, which is where the upper and lower eyelids meet beside the nose. The tears drain into the nose. Quite a lot of babies have a blocked tear duct, especially in the first few weeks after birth. This affects about 5% of all babies, and is really common. The duct may not be fully developed at birth. You may notice that this eye

remains blocked your GP may refer the baby to an eye specialist. They simply pass a very fine probe to help open the duct. Tear duct blockage is common, affecting a lot of babies. It is not serious and usually gets better within a matter of weeks or months.

Cataracts: A cataract develops when the lens within the eye becomes cloudy. This most commonly affects older people, and gradually impairs vision. A cataract is like trying to look through frosted glass! This can produce a glare

when driving at night. About 1 in 3 people aged 65y have a cataract, although many are minor and don't significantly impair vision. Doctors check new born babies for congenital cataracts, which are very rare, but may prevent the eye developing properly. We don't fully understand why cataracts develop. They usually start as tiny clusters of cloudiness, which gradually enlarge. Symptoms of age-related cataracts: Initially your vision can be a bit blurred, without improvement with spectacles. Some people also notice halos around bright lights, and less bright colour perception. Early cataracts often cause little or no visual disturbance. If you're having difficulty reading or watching TV treatment may be highly successful. The only way to treat cataracts is with surgery, removing the cloudy lens and replacing it with a clear plastic lens.

Cataract surgery: This operation usually takes just 10-20minutes, and is often done under local anaesthetic. Once the front of the eye is numb, a tiny incision is made to allow removal of the cloudy lens, and implantation of the new plastic lens. Usually no stitches are needed. In the next article I'll touch on some other quite common eye disorders, such as Age Related Macular Degeneration, conjunctivitis, myopia and eye injury. Should you have any concern about your eyes,

I'd really recommend visiting Glanmire Opticians in Crestfield.


Tíonsclaíocht í nGleann Maghair idir an 18ú agus an 19ú Céad Mícheál Ó Súilleabháin

Tá sé coitianta sna laethanta seo a bheith ag iarraidh tionsclóirí ó thíortha eile, ó Mheiriceá agus ó thíortha eile a mhealladh chun na tíre seo chun monarchana a bhunú . Is gá do rialtas na hÉireann deontais mhóra agus cánacha ísle a gheallúint dóibh chun iad a mhealladh chugainn. Is cinnte go gcuireann daoine fáilte roimh an obair ach, go minic, nuair a bhíonn deacrachtaí ag bagairt ar an gcomhlacht, ardaíonn siad a seolta agus as go brách leo ag cur go leor as obair. Measann roinnt daoine go mbeadh obair níos buaine ar fáil dá dtabharfaí na buntáistí céanna do thionsclóirí Éireannacha.

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Bhí mórán tionsclóirí Éireannacha gníomhach i nGleann Maghair idir 1780 agus 1900 nó mar sin. Bhí sé coitianta ag an am seo go n-úsáidfí cumhacht uisce chun muilte a oibriú. Toisc go raibh cumhacht uisce ar fáil i nGleann Maghair, bunaíodh muilte plúir, monarchana olla agus grúdlanna/drioglanna sa cheantar. Mar shampla, bhí 200 duine ag obair sa Glanmire & Riverstown Bleachworks sna 1830-idí. Ba le William Thorley & Son é. Rinneadh líon éadaigh garbh ann. Ba iad na hoibreacha seo na cinn ba mhó i ndeisceart na tíre. Cheannaigh Thorley monarcha den chineál céanna ó Thomas Lyons & Co. Dá dheasca bhí smacht ag an dá mhonarcha ar an méid a bhí fágtha de thionscal an lín éadaigh i gCúige Mumhan. Rinneadar easpórtáil ar an éadach próiseálta go dtí Sasana, Meiriceá agus coilíneachtaí na Breataine.

Bhunaigh muintir Lane muileann sníomhacháin agus cardála le cumhacht uisce ag Baile Roisín. Cuireadh an snáth amach go dtí fíodóirí ag Shandon. Tugadh an t-éadach sníofa ar ais go Baile Roisín agus rinneadh dathú air. Bhí monarcha a rinne priontáil ar chadás agus ar líon éadaigh ag Henry Sadlier & Co. Tonsclóirí móra ba ea iad agus bhí roinnt muilte acu thart ar chathair Chorcaí. Bhí oibrithe bánaithe acu i mBaile Roisín. Thug an tiarna talún Brown



talamh ar cíos don chomhlacht chun líon éadaigh a dhéanamh.

Rinneadh Acht an Aontais a chuir deireadh le Parlaimint na hÉireann sa bhliain 1800. Níor comhlíonadh na geallúintí a tugadh agus de réir a chéile ritheadh dlíthe a chuir as go mór don easpórtáil agus, de réir a chéile, chuaigh tionscal na holla agus an chadáis agus an lín éadaigh i léig.

Sa tréimhse seo, bhí thart ar 27 drioglann thart ar chathair Chorcaí agus bhunaigh John Lyons

& Co. ceann díobh i mBaile Roisín. Sna 1830-idí bhí 120,000 galún uisce beatha á chur amach acu. Ach faoi dheireadh na 1840-idí bhí an drioglann dúnta. Ag an am seo bhí an tAthair Maitiú tar éis gluaiseacht na measarthachta a chur ar siúl agus bhí éifeacht mhór aige, a bhí diúltach, ar thionscal an uisce bheatha. Bhí grúdlann ag muintir Arnott sa chathair agus cheannaigh siad an Riverstown Ale Brewery a lean go dtí 1901. Teaghlach cáiliúil ba ea muintir Arnott. Bhí duine díobh ina Mhéara ar Chorcaigh nuair a rinneadh atógáil ar Dhroichead Phádraig sna 1850-idí agus ba é an teaghlach céanna a d'oscail an t-ollstór cáiliúil den ainm céanna i mBaile Átha Cliath.

Bhí tionscal an iarainn tábhachtach i nGleann Maghair, chomh maith. D'oscail duine de mhuintir Lavit muileann iarainn i mBaile Roisín. Úgónaigh a tháinig ón bhFrainc ba ea iad agus Ionnaigh roinnt díobh i gcathair Chorcaí. Tá Cé Lavit sa chathair ainmnithe as an teaghlach seo. Faoi 1826 bhí dhá Iongchlós i nGleann Maghair á rith ag Knight agus Wheeler. Bhíodar in ann árthaigh a dheisiú agus seirbhís a dhéanamh orthu. Tógadh roinnt bád seoil le cabhail adhmaid ag an Iongchlós seo.

Léiríonn an cuntas seo go raibh paróiste Ghleann Maghair an-ghnóthach nuair a bhí an chéad réabhlóid thionsclaíoch ag teacht chun cinn.
