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Glanmire FC play it SAFE

Glanmire Football Club are this year pairing their Four-mile Road Race with SAFE, the Glanmire area's suicide awareness group, to raise vital funds for a desperately needed community bus.

SAFE was formed following a spike in suicides in the area during 2009, with the steering group consisting of residents and local projects and services.

The core work of the group is to raise mental health awareness through education in suicide prevention, self-management skills in young people and to provide information, counselling, advice and support while working in partnership with anybody that shares its commitment to suicide prevention, such as the Glanmire Youth Initiative and Glanmire Drugs Task Force Project.

Brian Lotty, committee member of Glanmire Football Club, has organised the run for the past 14 years with the intention of raising funds for the club but in its 15th year a change was made. He said: "I've been race director for 14 years and I'm thinking of stepping back. So on my final run we decided to partner with a local charity that involves the youth. Suicide goes across all sports and Irish society and the work SAFE does for the area hasn't gone unnoticed."

Funds raised will go towards the SAFE community bus, a free means of transport, in cooperation with An Garda Síochána, for the elderly and youth of the greater Glanmire area. The service will integrate and engage as many isolated people as possible in the spread-out and poorly infra structured suburb and its hinterland.

A figure in the region of €30,000 is needed to fulfil the project, so more runners than ever before are needed, Mr Lotty says: "Normally, about 600 athletes take part in the Four-mile



Road Race. Our target this year is to increase the participants to in excess of 900. Suicide has blighted this community and everyone has been affected by it in some way so we need as many as possible to come out and acknowledge this issue and show their support."

The race will take place at 8pm from Glanmire Football Club on Wednesday 15 June with registration closing at 7.30pm, although runners are advised to register ahead of time on glanmiregaa.ie or sourcehealthandfitness. com to avoid delays.

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
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

R639 Sallybrook Pedestrian Crossing, Glanmire

Please be advised that Cork County Council commenced a Part 8 Planning process on Friday 6th May for a proposed pedestrian crossing and associated works on the R639 at Sallybrook,

A copy of the Part 8 report outlining the proposed works will be on public display in the Cork County Council Offices, Ballinglanna, Glanmire for a six week period from Friday May 6th until Friday 17th June. Members of the public will have the opportunity to make submissions and observations on the proposed scheme for a further two week period up to 1st July.

Hazelwood Improvement Project

Cork County Council has identified the requirements to enhance the Hazelwood, Glanmire area. The section of the road which forms the main artery of the study area is the road which extends from the existing junction between the R615 and R639 to the roundabout junction with Brooklodge Grove to the East. The purpose of the project is:

To provide enhanced pedestrian facilities and permeability, cycle facilities, flood management proposals, landscape improvements and junction upgrades.

At the Public Exhibition the draft proposals set out:

- Pedestrian facilities along the roadway
- Locations of pedestrian crossings
- Treatment of side roads / entrances
- Speed control measures
 - Cycle facilities

- Design of signalisation of the R639 junction
- Design of upgrade of R639 junction
- Landscaping
- Signage
- Flood management proposals

This exhibition is an important opportunity for you to let us know your views on the recommendations, and is the final consultation before the completion of the Project.

L3004 GLOUNTHAUNE TRAFFIC CALMING SCHEME

On review of the existing junction it was found that the main road consists of a wide single carriageway road with no traffic calming measures and limited pedestrian crossing facilities. The proposed scheme introduces traffic islands, build outs and an uncontrolled pedestrian crossing point to the west of the junction. The proposed scheme is designed to benefit all road users with a specific emphasis on vulnerable road users.

The following lists the principal features of the proposed scheme:

- Installation of an uncontrolled pedestrian crossing.
- Installation of build outs and traffic islands.
- Alterations to existing footpaths and construction of new footpaths.
- Public Lighting Upgrades.
- Provision of a right turn lane for vehicular traffic.
- Alterations to existing drainage.
- Installation of new road markings and

ROAD RESURFACING AT R639 (RIVERSTOWN CROSS)

I think all residents in the Glanmire area are fully aware of the terrible condition of the R639 from Riverstown Cross up to the Hazelwood Junction. Unfortunately the patch work completed on the road isn't standing up to scrutiny. The Area Engineer has therefore agreed to bring the road resurfacing planned for 2017 forward to this summer. The job is now out for tender and due to be finalised in the next few weeks. The Area Engineer anticipates that resurfacing will begin in June/July.

THE LOCAL AREA PLAN & CAHERLAG

The second edition of the 2014 Cork County Development Plan was published in January 2015, and the Local Area Plan relative to Caherlag states that; "the strategic aim is to preserve the rural character of the village and encourage small scale expansion, generally through low density individual housing, in tandem with the provision of services". It points out that Caherlag is served by a 4.8m wide local road L-2890-0 but there is no reference to the fact that it lacks a footpath even though there is an adequate verge which could accommodate one? Caherlag is designated; a "Village Nucleus" which is one of nine in the Blarney Electoral Area, and these are settlements where a limited range of services are provided to supply a very local need. Such designated villages would normally have a permanent resident population plus one of the following; a convenience shop, pub, post office, primary school, church, or other community facility. The Erins Own Complex has obviously been a factor in Caherlag's designation as the plan refers to; "the substantial GAA facility within the development boundary". The plan highlights the fact that; "the settlement has a very limited range of social and community facilities". It references "Population & Housing" and states that thirty one units were recorded within the development boundary of Caherlag in 2010, which was a rise of six units from the 2001 figure. It states that; "a significant number of these units are long established, particularly those to the north of the Frins Own GAA Grounds, which reflect the established grain of residential development that exists within the area and any new development should be in character with the scale and grain of the village". The plan encourages small scale residential and community facilities. It points out that there is no public foul treatment or sewer network in the Caherlag area and; "until the infra-

structural constraints are overcome, new housing development should be restricted to individual houses and serviced sites".

Over the lifetime of the Local Area Plan,

which is to 2020, it is considered that the village nucleus of Caherlag can accommodate a maximum growth of five units. Any new individual housing schemes should be of one to two

units and the development boundary which will remain relatively unchanged has been drawn to reflect existing development and to provide sufficient land to accommodate the level of growth anticipated. The plan states; "it is considered that the most appropriate lands for future residential development are located to the north east of the development boundary. Given the lack of adequate mains sewerage treatment facilities and the timespan within which this deficiency is likely to be resolved, future development will need to provide its own individual on-site wastewater treatment facilities". The foregoing is a synopsis of the principal subjects addressed in the Local Area Plan relative to Caherlag. Incidentally, the January 2015 issue of Area News referred to the then recently erected directional signpost at Caherlag and pointed out that the burial ground has always been known as "Caherlag Graveyard", not "Cemetery" as shown on the signpost, which was also

incorrectly spelt, and that it is identified as "Graveyard" on the entrance pillars as well as on the nearby heritage board. The understanding is that a graveyard, unlike a cemetery, is located within church grounds however that is the techni-

> cal aspect but people use the descriptions interchangeably today. The description "cemetery" is of a relative modern usage and it conjures up an image of orderly, straight pleasing rows of gravesites and one example of this is St. Joseph's Cemetery, Little Island. The description "graveyard" is more archaic and it portrays an ancient historic resting place; of high walls, an iron gate, varying size headstones, some slanted and with the inscriptions almost worn down by time and weather, and also low uninscribed grave markers. Caherlag has all of these characteristics but the most important factor is that the burial ground has always been known locally as "Caherlag Graveyard". Accordingly it is pleasing to observe that the brown coloured signpost is replaced by one which shows: "Caherlag Gravevard"!





ASHBOURNE

The September 2014 issue of Area News referenced the Direct Provision Centre at Ashbourne and suggested that the residents should get involved in local community activities; "there are plenty of varied choices available to them and apart from the integration aspect within the community it also gives them the opportunity of giving something back. The Tidy Towns is one of the many examples that they could get involved in and a project such as the

responsibility for the upkeep of the nearby "Old Road" would be very appropriate". How naive! The following was published in the March issue of Glounthaune Community News; "raised bed gardening help wanted; could you spare an hour or two per week

to assist the residents of Ashbourne Direct Provision Centre to dig, plant and look after a few existing raised beds?" It is pleasing to admire the residents' pride on their efforts of keeping "their" house in order but the fact that they feel that it is necessary to rely on the local community to achieve this is simply mind-boggling. Let's call a spade a spade! What is involved here is a request to fellow parishioners to perform voluntary work at commercial premises and another issue is that

the precious time involved would be at the expense of further beautifying public community areas. Is the referenced work not "part and parcel" of the commercial operation? What next — the ironing?! The lucrative business at the Ashbourne Direct Provision Centre has been operated par excellence for circa fifteen years now and this is confirmed by the various inspection reports issued by the RIA over this period. However, would suggest that the



is the quality, the character and the presentation today of the once magnificent gardens? How many gardeners are employed there? Michael Garde, a director of the previous owners', advises per a blog that the grounds have been allowed to fall into decline and states that when he saw them about three years ago there appeared to be no work happening. Interestingly, he also comments that when the directors of Ashbourne House Hotel sold the premises it was clear to them that it was destined to be used as an asylum centre

with a view to running it down and then building on it. He reckons that this was interrupted with the crash - and note the word; "interrupted"! The grounds are in private ownership but have Cork County Council a role to ensure that the standard of the "Preserved Garden" status prevails? Michael states that it would take some intervention from local residents to get some action. Why not the Community Association? The Glounthaune community has a special affinity with Ashbourne and it was a popular setting when a hotel; let it be a wedding, a family gathering, a christening, a birthday, a first communion, a confirmation, a dinner-dance, or a place where the innocent local lads played football on the excellent manicured croquet lawn! It was also possible for the children to play in a carefree environment and furthermore locals who were employed there down through the years have many happy memories of the house and gardens which are steeped in history. The gardens were known and acclaimed worldwide and in the past were open to the public one Sunday per annum. The Cork St. Vincent De Paul Society was the beneficiary of the monies raised from the entrance fees as well as from the sale of teas and scones, which of course in Glounthaune is pronounced minus the "e"! Richard Beamish, of brewery fame resided at Ashbourne House and he laid out his alpine and sub-tropical gardens in 1900. Included were plants from China which were introduced by E.H. Wilson and from New Zealand by Captain Dorrien Smith of Tresco Abbey in the Scilly Isles. Notable specimen included; "Haplocartha Scaposa" from South Africa together with the rare "Mexico White

Pine" or "Pinus Ayachuite" which is the tallest in Ireland or Britain. He is credited with the name; "Meconopsis Beamshii" which is a beautiful yellow flowering poppy that originated at Ashbourne in 1906. Ashbourne Gardens had a number of distinguishing features which included; an unusual arched Irish Yew walk, a woodland garden and a bog garden. The house, which is a listed building with a record protected structure number 00498, was later acquired by the Hallinan family, who owned the Avoncore Mills at Midleton which was formerly Hackett's Distillery. One of their grandchildren was John Magnier of Coolmore Stud fame. Hallinan's employees' developed the gardens further and commuted from Midleton Station, where the mill was located nearby, per the Youghal Line train to Queenstown Junction, which was probably already in place when the Midleton section of the line opened in 1859. The station was re-named Cobh Junction on September 25th.1928 and subsequently Glounthaune on August 27th.1994. A German lady, Timi Garde purchased the house for five thousand pounds in 1960 and it was opened as "Ashbourne House Hotel" in May 1961 by the then Lord Mayor of Cork, Stephen Barrett T.D. It is regrettable that prior to the sale large indefinitive number of trees and shrubs were removed by the auctioneers. In 1996, at a time when Enda Kenny was Tourism Minister, the owners' were considering promoting Ashbourne as; "A Great Garden of Ireland" which would have involved European funding but disappointingly they did not proceed with the plan and alas the hotel closed in May 2000.

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A BITTER HEARTBREAKER



Hairy bittercress with its white blooms is a sneaky plant! It has cleverly adapted a sly trick or two for better survival. Read on but ignore it at your peril.

If you talk to gardeners they always seem to be in a state of waiting; for rain or sun, for roses to bloom, perennials to show colour, for the dying down of bulb foliage, for autumn colour. They're constantly in a state of expectation and hope, watching in anguish or jubilation, forever urged on with greater ambitions. Can gardeners be otherwise? Can there be times where they can forget about their plants or must commitment be total? I fear the latter for gardening is the essence of continuation. Leave a garden for seven days and it seems to sense your absence and go to pot as a result. No amount of catching up later can eradicate the enforced neglect and when it comes to weeds, you may find the battle lost for the entire growing season.

I scarcely dare trust myself to speak on weeds. They grow as if the devil was in them. They come in an unalterable, even decorous procession, battalion after battalion, legion following legion and the sneakiest of the

lot is surely Hairy Bittercress,

botanically known as Cardamine hirsute. In Glanmire and Riverstown it grows all year round and even in bleakest January it shows up brightly when its little white flowers appear. At this stage it looks innocent and unthreatening but beware its simplicity, for as soon as the flowers fade the stems elongate, the seed pod curls and lengthens and the little seeds inside fatten and ripen. At this point, it is too late to take action for at the least touch to the outer covering of the seed pods they explode with a force that expels the seeds far and wide.

Another generation of weeds has been born!

Along with being sneaky, the hairy bittercress has cleverly adapted a sly trick or two for better survival. Firstly it turns a rather dark bronze colour just before expelling its progeny. It also seems to be able to distinguish between regular ground disturbance and that which is left rather fallow. In beds and borders where constant cultivation is practiced the weed matures and expels its seeds

whilst still relatively small and inconspicuous. Where the ground is left undisturbed for long periods it grows far taller and over a much longer timeframe.

Chemical control is difficult for this 'garden centre weed' moves only in the very best horticultural circles, invading choice perennials and summer bedding alike, all with equal relish. Constant use of the hoe or hand

pulling is the only sure way to get any measure of control.

I close with a word on the nastiest of all the weeds, the sycophant dandelion. It arrives, seemingly from nowhere and is cunningly constructed to thwart easy extraction. When you grasp it and attempt to pull it from

the ground it seems to melt away in a soft squash for it has no leaf fibre or substance. You end up with a fistful of mush leaving the root firmly anchored in the ground. If you don't want to eradicate these using chemicals, try a pinch of salt in the centre of its crown!

You'll be surprised at the result.

THE JUNE GARDEN

COSMOS: I presume that you've sworn not to add another plant to the garden for the remainder of the year but could you possibly find it in your heart to source half a dozen plants of an annual which is full of lightness and transparency? Cosmos is what I have in mind for its delicate, fern-like foliage permits you to see through to plants beyond. This attractive framework of wispy, thread-like foliage is covered with flowers from mid-summer. These are broad and with petals like a daisy, and they come in warm shades of mainly pink and red (white too) all with golden yellow centres.

As with other annuals, it is important to dead-head these to encourage prolonged flowering, but take note the peculiarity of this much branched plant which makes dead-heading such an easy and indeed rewarding exercise. Each mature flower has two budding stems which branch off at the base of its stalk. To remove the dead head, you simply cut the stalk at the branching point and the one flower is soon replaced by two! When these are over, you cut the joint stem lower down, at the point at which two further branches arise. Aided by this deadheading, multiplication of flowers continues through the summer!

ROSES: Good rose blooms will be encouraged by the warm weather and once the first flush of bloom have faded gently snap off the heads. Dead heading roses on a summer evening of course is an occupation to carry us back into a calmer age and a different century- certainly back to our childhood and to those we watched performing the same kind of pleasurable chore. Goodness, but how the years fly.

FOR A DARK CORNER: Did I ever mention to you that Choisya ternata 'Sundance' will glow in an enchanting chartreuse shade when planted in dappled or light shade? Get this one if you have a fairly dark corner to fill for it will lighten the spot every month but dramatically from October to March. Much more use should be made of this freely available, inexpensive, evergreen, scented shrub, so get one before summer fades.

BASKET TOMATOES: Last year I got a small hanging basket at Dooley's and it contained a special variety of tumbler tomatoes. I can say here and now that I got more pleasure and produce from this small planting than from anything else edible in the entire garden. Try one!

THE LAWN: Whether you're inviting the neighbours around for a barbecue or throwing a garden party during the long bright evenings of midsummer, spare a thought for the grass beneath your feet! No matter how well maintained your lawn is, it is all too easy to see it ruined by an evening of heavy shoe activity. Maintaining a pristine turf is a more expensive investment per square foot than any other horticultural technique but if you follow a few basic steps,

your lawn should recover from nearly everything you throw at it!

The following tips will help the sward recover quickly;

- · Always water the grass following a garden party especially if it's showing signs of stress by wilting.
- · If the traffic has been very heavy (and the ground soft) it is vital to undertake some aeration. On a small lawn, do this with a

garden fork, pushing it in as far as it will go then wiggling it back and forth across the entire surface. For large areas, hire an aerator


- · Follow the golf club regime and push the turf back over any scuffs and tears, back filling holes with an equal mixture of peat moss and sand.
- \cdot Sow completely bald patches (those areas

immediately beneath the edges of tables and chairs) with a mixture of seed, sand and compost.

· Fertilize the entire area lightly and if rain is not forecast, give a good watering to wash it in.

When cutting, make sure the blades are really sharp. Blunt mower blades tear the grass and make it vulnerable to fungal infections.

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

Knockraha Remembers 1916

On Sunday the 5th of June at Liberty Hall at 3pm James Connolly-Heron, a great-grandson of James Connolly who was a signatory of the Proclamation, will unveil a plaque to remember all those from Knockraha who took part in the War of Independence. James has been a leading light in the 1916 celebrations in Dublin and is leading the campaign for the retention of the houses in Moore Street where the 1916 leaders made the final decision to surrender. Liberty Hall in Knock-

raha is a building where the local Volunteers Company was formed by Martin Corry. It is on the back road Knockraha to Carrigtwohill in the townland of Ballinbrittig. It was here that many important meetings were held and become more or less the headquarters of the Volunteers in East Cork. The East Cork Flying Column that was wiped out at Clonmult was formed in Liberty Hall. It is named after the iconic building in Dublin where the Rising started and in the past year it has been completely refurbished by the

Knockraha History & Heritage Society and should now stand into the next Millennium without much maintenance. There are already two plaques on its gable wall, one saying 'we serve neither King nor Kaiser but Ireland', the Irish Republican flag flying proudly over it. On the evening of the 5th of June we'll have a very varied programme. As well as James Connolly-Heron, Sean Kelleher (secretary of the Kilmichael and Crossbarry commemoration committee) and Dan Crane (a descendent of the Hogans from Kilquane from Washington D.C. where he was high up in the political establishment being a legislative assistant to Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan, a leading Irish-American politician) will be in attendance. Amy Murphy will sing the Ballad of James Connolly and the well-known singer Art Supple will sing some rebel songs. A pupil from Knockraha National School will read the proclamation. There will be a piper

to play some laments and a colour party from the army. Later in the evening we will have a dinner in the Park Hotel in Midleton with James Connolly-Heron as our principle guest. Tickets will be available from \in 25 for a 4 course meal and can be obtained by contacting Jim Fitzgerald on 087 986 4177 in advance.

It is only recently that the contribution of the Knockraha Company to the National struggle for independence has been realised with some unique activities which were not undertaken anywhere else in Ireland. At the instigation of Sean Hegarty, O.C. Cork No. 1 Brigade, vault in Kilquane graveyard, Knockraha known as Sing-Sing was used as a prison where over 100 inmates were detained including Black and Tans, auxiliaries and spies with up to 20 being executed out of it. Many had eerie experiences and Eve Morton, a well-known author from Dublin, is writing a book on ghost experiences during the War of Independence and she will be including the stories of Sing-Sing and the famous black dog of Ballqohig who could not be shot. And so the War

> of Independence in Knockraha is now well-known nationally, being the subject TV documentaries, newspaper articles, history books and other publications and people are travelling from all over Ireland to see our independent sites. Knockraha was very useful for undercover activities with glens and bogs in the area. As well as these activities many people on the run stayed in Knockraha,

including on many occasions Sean Hegarty, O.C. Cork No. 1 Brigade, who operated out of Knockraha. The Knockraha History Society have many weapons that were used in the War of Independence which we have taken to many exhibitions all over Ireland including Dublin, Armagh and Belfast. And in recognition of Knockraha's contribution to the War of Independence, four of our members were invited to a dinner in the Waterstone Hotel in Belfast to commemorate the 1916 Rising in Dublin. The function was a sell-out with over 1,000 people attending with all shades of nationalist opinion in the North represented.

The Knockraha weapons will be on display in Liberty Hall on the 5th of June, including a rifle from the Aud, a maxim machine gun, rifles taken from the British and small arms and the moulds from which the hand grenades were made. The Cork Remembering the Volunteers organisation will also bring more memorabilia

for display including historic photographs. It will be a very historic day and one not to be missed.

Update from your Local County Councillor Sinead Sheppard on Glanmire municipal council for 2015/2016

We are now finishing up our second year on the Cobh/ Glanmire municipal council and Cork County Council and it has been a very busy year on a lot of levels.

I think it is important to let you the residents know what funding your council is supplying and works that are being carried out in your local area.

In the last year the 2015 Town Development Fund awarded €10,000 to the Glanmire business network for a business website and directory.

€20,000 has also been spent on the plans for the Hazelwood improvement project. This is a long term project and will depend on the funding that becomes available over the coming years, but we as a council are very keen to see this in the future and will be working hard in the hope that we see this come to fruition.

The Town development fund of €135,000 is available every year to be spent in the 3 main towns of Glanmire, Cobh and Carraigtwohill and I would urge businesses or groups with an economic development project for the Glanmire area to apply for this funding through the municipal council, details are available online or you can contact me personally.

Grants...

Residents associations in Glanmire area this year was awarded funding to the amount of €2060.

Amenity grants awarded to the Glanmire area amounted

Capital grants awarded to the Glanmire area amounted to € 12,500.

Community grants awarded to Glanmire Area €26,000. This form of grant aid will be available each year and will come available again early in 2017 and I would encourage all groups to apply for funding when it is launched again in 2017.

Roads are a problem for us across the whole county and is a constant battle to secure funding for all roads that we would like to see works on. Here is a list of projects being done this year.

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

The Port of Cork is expecting over 50 major Cruise Liners to visit Cobh this year, with over 20,000 visitors expected on Leeside within a 10 -day period alone, generating a multi-million boost for Cork's retailers and café's, as well as, major tourist attractions, such as, Shandon, Blarney village and the iconic Blarney Castle."

Cork airport is also benefiting from the increased travel demand and have announced multiple new routes which will operate this

Leeside AFC is the local football club in Little Island and it is one which is currently thriving, with the numbers of players at the club rising dramatically over the last five years in particular.

With players coming from Glanmire, Riverstown and nearby Glounthaune, the club has gone through a massive transformation in recent times, with the spectacular rise in population in Glanmire and the surrounding areas one of the main contributing fac-

The club, originally called Little Island Albion, has also improved its facilities. It now boasts two full-sized playing pitches as well as a huge indoor hall and two recently completed astro-turf pitches, while they also make use of the close-by full sized astro-turf pitch in Carrigtwohill Community Centre.

Boasting between 15 and 20 underage teams plus junior and senior sides, the latter which is currently embroiled in an intense promotion battle with local rivals Riverstown, the standard and amount of footballers has risen to new

PRO for the club Padraig O'Sullivan says that the club which is experiencing a unique upturn in fortunes: "We're currently doing exceptionally well," says O'Sullivan, who has been plying his proverbial trade for the senior side for the past 14 years and was semi-retired for the opening half of the season.

"The facilities have improved massively and the numbers at the club have increased five-fold. We have two underage teams at almost every age group now. The academy was on its knees around five years ago to be honest, we had one fella running it and I think we might have taken him for granted, when he left things fell apart a bit.

"We brought in a host of new coaches and revitalised it again, all the coaches we've brought it as well have some top-



level amateur playing experience, they know their stuff. Most of them have also played for the club as well.

"The population is definitely a big factor too. The Glanmire area has exploded and we have a lot of players coming

from both there and Glounthaune. Riverstown FC have had a huge increase in the number of players as well and I think they're almost at full capacity. I think both clubs are benefitting," he adds.

The upgrading of the facilities has been made possible with the help of various parties. Local businesses have donated huge amounts of money to the club, the community association have once again stepped up to the plate and the council also supplied a grant, with the astro-turf pitches completed earlier this year.

Most of the senior side consists of 23 year olds and under, with 32 year old O'Sullivan the second oldest player in the side, with the philosophy in the club now being to promote youth and implement energy, with the transformation of the academy indicative of what the club's long term plan is.

One of the brightest prospects of the academy is the prodigiously gifted Cathal O'Sullivan. The U9 player is the grandson of one of the founders of the club Jimmy O'Sullivan and already plays with the U11s, with Padraig O'Sullivan saying that he is one to look out for.

"He is absolutely astoundingly talented," says Padraig of the young midfielder. "He's just unbelievable to watch, he's played at U11 level and he's still able to score a few goals in a game. He's the only person in the south of Ireland who has been selected to go over to the Swansea City academy. We don't get too many players heading cross channel.

"He is heading over there this weekend and I think he'll do brilliantly, I definitely think he's destined to make it in the long term, he'll definitely go all the way."

Know Your Rights - June 2016

Our landlord phoned to ask us to leave the house we have rented for the last three years because he plans to sell the house. Do we have to accept this?

As you have been renting the house for three years, you have what is called a "Part 4 tenancy", which gives you certain rights. The landlord can only end your tenancy for certain specified reasons. An intention to sell the roperty within three months counts as a valid reason. However, a phone call is not a valid form of notice. You nust get a written notice of termination, signed and dated, stating the reason for termination and giving you the proper period of notice, which, in your case, as ou have rented for three years, is 12 weeks (84 days). When a landlord plans to sell the property, the notice of termination must include a statement that he intends to sell the property within three months after the tenncy ends. The Residential Tenancies Board (RTB) publishes sample notices of termination with the detailed information that is required in various situations. In the case of a planned sale, the wording of the required statement is: "The reason for the termination of the enancy is due to the fact that the landlord intends to sell the dwelling, for full consideration, within three nths after the termination of the tenancy"

Your landlord must also make a statutory declaration that he intends to enter into an enforceable agreemen to sell his full interest in the house. (A statutory declaration is a solemn statement, which must be signed in the presence of someone who is authorised to witness statutory declarations - such as a practising solicitor, a Peace Commissioner, a notary public or a Commissioner for Oaths.) The RTB's sample notice of termination for a landlord planning to sell contains sample wording for this statutory declaration, which you should receive along with the notice of termination

If your landlord is found to have evicted you illegally, he may be required to pay you substantial damages.

he Gaff is Back!

Local GAA man Edward 'The Gaff' Gaffey is back on the pitch after a horrendous cruciate injury, and credits much of his recovery to determined goal-setting helped by the trainers at Educogym in Glanmire.

"I had surgery to physically repair my knee, and then months of physiotherapy to get the range of motion back, because you can't build muscle until you have range of motion", says 19 year old Gaffey, who plays for Sarsfields GAA Club.

"I was still struggling though, as the psychological impact was huge. I lost all confidence in being able to plant my leg down solidly. I felt like I'd lost the connection between my brain and my leg; not only was it weak but it felt like it didn't belong to me."

Having heard about the results-driven Educogym programme, Gaffey met with the trainers there and after assessment they realised he was favouring his 'good' leg to compensate for the one that had been damaged, and was tentative in relying on the repaired knee.

The Educogym model places a strong emphasis on envisioning an end goal; then working towards the desired result in a structured way.

"They worked with me to rebuild not just my strength and flexibility; but my confidence. I'd always been part of a team on the pitch, so found working alone to recover quite tough- in Educogym I was part of a team again; with support and encouragement that made all the difference", explains Gaffey. "We rebuilt everything- power; movement; self-assurance - until I could pivot and land my leg soundly and feel safe. I finally got enough confidence to play a Junior B hurling match - my first one in a whole year - and I felt like a kid again. All the enthusiasm and confidence came back. I got knocked down, but I was able to jump straight back up and keep going."

After the physical trauma had healed; it was Gaffey's psyche that got the boost he needed to play again. "I'm playing a Junior A match this week, and I'm ready for it- Educogym helped me repair physically and mentally, and I couldn't say enough good things about
