LAURA FROM PAGE I. In early September the letter arrived informing us that Laura had been selected for the Irish team to participate in the World Games in Los Angeles in July 2015. The other good news was that Laura's good friend Aoife O Sullivan from Ballinlough was also named in the team. The family's flights and accommodation were booked within the week-it was too good an opportunity to miss!! Thus began the journey that involved up to four training sessions a week and monthly trips to Dublin for Team Ireland training. Laura could be found at home practicing her beam routines and new words such as "arabesque" and "passe balance" could be heard around the house. Laura's coaches Mary O' Donovan and Zelie Moran saw to it that there was no let up over the Christmas and Easter holidays while at the same time Laura was preparing for her Junior Certificate examinations.

As the departure date drew near there were visits to EMC, huge supporters of Special Olympics, a visit to the Lord Mayor's office and a reception hosted by Eircom, who have supported Special Olympics since the beginning. On Laura's final visit to Dublin she received her Team Ireland gear, which was a fantastic honour for Laura and her whole family.

After a huge send off in Dublin Airport, Team Ireland headed for the host town of Downey, a 45 minute drive south of Los Angeles. The reception there was fantastic and their photographs were on the front page of the local newspaper. During their time there, the Team made a visit to the local Coca Cola factory, however as they were in strict training, no Coca Cola was consumed (apparently)!! On the Friday the Team left Downey and headed for UCLA where they were based for the duration of the competition. While it might have been holiday time for the family it was all business for the team with regular training sessions.

The opening ceremony can only be described as magical. Our hosts did a fantastic job and the biggest cheer of the night was when Team Ireland entered the stadium; the Irish family contingent of 300 sounded more like 30,000. One of the highlights for Laura was when actor Colin Farrell took her hand and walked into the stadium with her and kissed her on the cheek!!!

On Sunday the games began in earnest and Cork man Sean Coleman was quickly on the podium with a Silver medal in swimming. Many more medals were to follow for Team Ireland. Aoife took a well-earned gold in rhythmic gymnastics and the stage was set for Laura's competition. The competition is held over two days, the first day accounting for 25% of the overall score. Laura was very pleased with her performance, achieving a personal best on the floor and on the bars. Excitement was mounting as Laura's final competition was the last competition of the entire games. The tension was palpable as, based on the scores, Laura was just outside the medals with one event to go. She stepped up to the bars and began the routine she had practiced so many times. However, at the last minute, her coach had added another element of difficulty to the routine to gain extra marks which, to the amateur coaches among us, seemed to pay off. Would it be enough? The wait for the results was almost unbearable until she walked out, looked towards the family and put up the sign for first. The mixture of joy, excitement and pride felt in that moment almost defied description and will live long in the memory!! All the training and hard work had paid off and Laura was the proud bearer of an Olympic Gold medal.

On the Team's return the reception at Dublin Airport was fantastic and it was great to see so many family members and friends there to welcome the Olympic heroes home. On the Thursday night the Glanmire community turned out in huge numbers to welcome Laura in their own special way. Laura, escorted by our local Gardai was taken on a chauffeur drive around Glanmire with full motorbike escort followed by a reception in Sars GAA Pavilion.

We would like to thank all those who helped to make this a memorable night for Laura and her family. To quote Laura, "this is the best night of my life"!

Finally we would like to thank the Special Olympics organisation and particularly Eunice Kennedy Shriver for founding this wonderful organisation that has given such joy and happiness to our children. Where to from here? Training begins again in two weeks' time!!!

ST. LAPPAN'S PLACE

The St. Lappan's Place and Ballyverry Residents Association celebrated the diamond anniversary of the blessing and dedication of St. Lappan's Place on Sunday August 2nd. The meticulous arrangements were first class and the thoughtful and meaningful act of placing a wreath at St. Joseph's Cemetery in remembrance of those residents who passed to their eternal award was touching. Hilda Keohane chaired the event in a splendid relaxed and very informative style. The extensive photo exhibition brought back happy and indeed sentimental memories to many. Paddy Twomey shared his excellent historical knowledge of the area and his attention to detail and the chronological sequence covered in his presentation was outstanding. However Paddy appeared to be a little mystified with the altar boy state of affairs but perhaps that was a sniff of Little Island mischievousness?! After all it is generally accepted in the parish that "The Thaunies" are the only ones considered for such ecclesiastical assignments! This was also exemplified recently with the appointment of David O'Connell, a past pupil of Glounthaune N.S., as Auxiliary Bishop to the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, which has a five million catholic population. However "The Islanders" may be comforted somewhat by the fact that John Anthony (Tony) Kenneally, a past pupil of Little Island N.S., is Monsignor of Savannah, U.S.A. Is it not time for both schools to appropriately recognise such attainments? Fr. John Heinhold blessed the houses at the celebration and he was ably assisted by the still ever so youthful altar boy, who it is said also performed with such eminence at the 1955 dedication! There was a varied entertainment presentation including the Jacinta O'Sullivan Irish Dancers, which was appropriate as Jacinta was born in St. Lappan's Place and resided there for a lengthy period. The young children present were captivated by the magician's skilled performance, and of course they also enjoyed the plentiful supply of treats. There were some exquisite bouquets of flowers on display, which were presented to well-worthy recipients, and Paul of "Flower Power" Glounthaune must be complimented in this regard. Well done also to Bernie for the sumptuous spread of food and it would be very difficult to quantify the time taken to prepare and present such tempting offers. Fitzpatrick's Shop supplied the mouth-watering birthday cake and it was fitting that longtime resident Mrs. Kathleen Hayes

performed the ceremonial cutting. Fitzpatrick's Shop also provided an abundant supply of their benchmark cakes. There were many old faces, sorry past residents, in the gathering and it was particularly nostalgic for John Byrne who made the long overnight journey from Carrigaline. The celebration was held on the very same "Green" that John learned his soccer skills which entertained the crowds for many decades thereafter. Shin guards were not compulsory in John's playing days but apparently his direct opponents always wore them!

Kieran Murphy, the popular former milk roundsman was also in attendance and his presence illustrated the fact that he is still regarded as being very much part of our community, and he is remembered dearly. Kieran is a proud mid-Cork native and was a sportsman of note. He played hurling with Cloughduv and football with sister club Canovee. In 1962 he captained the divisional side Muskerry in the Cork county senior football championship final versus Macroom. It was a low scoring game with Macroom victorious on a 3-04 to 1-04 scoreline. Kieran wounddown his sporting career playing hurling with Erins Own, which was then a junior grade club. St. Lappan's Place looked splendid on the day with the beautifully decorated houses complemented by the well maintained "Green" and ornate planting. Sixty years have slipped by since the official opening and in fact it was originally planned to build the fifty houses at Rockgrove Camp. Negotiations were on-going during the late forties between Cork County Council / Cork Corporation and the Department of Finance for the disposal of Rockgrove for housing purposes. On November 29th.1949 the Department of Finance agreed to lease the property "where the huts stand" to the councils; "when the refugees have vacated the premises". They remained at Rockgrove until 1953. The lease was for ninety nine years with an annual rent of £100.00 and the lessee responsible for maintenance, rates and insurance. There was also a stipulation that fourteen houses

- reconstructed huts - be reserved for military personnel stationed at Cork. However on August 18th.1951 the Department of Defence advised the Department of Finance that the councils were not going ahead with the proposal as a new housing scheme was planned for Little Island. Hence St. Lappan's Place. The diamond celebrations exemplify what a close-knit community can achieve through pride, leadership, determination, prudent planning, hard work and dedication. The torrential rain experienced towards the end of the function did not dampen the spirit and enthusiasm of those who contributed handsomely towards its success.

RAIL SERVICE

A campaign has been launched to extend late night services on the Cork / Cobh rail link. The group behind the initiative includes members of Cobh Municipal Council, and the public are urged to get involved and offer feedback and ideas through the group's public consultation process. Those interested in joining the campaign may email cobhrail@gmail. com, or post contributions before September 11th.to: Cobh Rail, Cork County Council, Carrig House, Spy Hill, Cobh. The lack of a late night service was highlighted here on the February 2012 issue. QUOTE: The last train from Cork is at 10.30 p.m. and 10.00 p.m. on Sundays' whereas some years ago when customers were not treated as such, and referred to as passengers; the last train ex Cork was at 11.25 p.m. UNQUOTE. Those departure times are still in place and furthermore the last "late night" train to Midleton on Sundays' is at 8.15 p.m.! The article also referred to the fact that there are two numbered platforms at Glounthaune Station but there is no signage to advise which to utilise for the Cork, Cobh or Midleton bound trains. The bus service was also mentioned and it should be noted that there are thirteen departures ex Cork on weekdays', fewer on Saturdays' and Sundays', which serve Glounthaune, as well as a somewhat similar number ex Glounthaune to Cork. However there are twenty six to Carrigtwohill which begs the question relative to the differential; why don't those thirteen buses exit the N25 at the Dunkettle Interchange rather than the Carrigtwohill West Junction 3? Naturally there is no stop on the N25 Parkway but if the Dunkettle Interchange was availed of both Glounthaune and Little Island would have an additional thirteen daily services in each direction, and an opportunity of securing additional customers for Bus Éireann would also be created. It is worth noting that there is no service from Cork on weekdays' between 10.30 and 14.05 although Carrigtwohill is served with four departures during the same period. Also, Glounthaune is not shown on the departures' screen at Parnell Place Bus Station, whilst Little Island is not even listed on the timetable! Is there a role for the local Community Associations to address the foregoing?

DEATH OF A GARDEN

The following article on Ashbourne House Glounlthaune is being re-printed in this month's magazine following the huge interest (and favorable comments) from readers of the Evening Echo.

Looking back through rose-tinted glasses I regret not taking more of an interest in the 1950's gardening scene! I say this because it now transpires that I spent much of my leisure time within a very short cycling distance of one the most important gardens found not alone within the county of Cork, but throughout Europe!

Its a hundred and thirty-five vears and more since the gardens at Ashbourne House at Glounthaune, Co. Cork were begun. One hundred and thirtyfive years since a few ramshackle acres on a sloping hillside were turned into one of the finest gardens ever created. The house had its heyday when known as 'Harmony Lodge', owned by Richard Beamish Henrik, 1862-1888. The alpine garden in particular was one of the finest in Europe for it contained rare orchids, gentian beds, saxifrages, blue poppies (Meconopsis) and rarities thought only to grow in sub-tropical regions.

I remember visiting these gardens as a teenager when it opened yearly in aid of Cork Hospitals. Trying and imagine the glory of those days is like looking through the wrong end of a telescope. The memory seems remote and the misty images are cloudy and indistinct. Any yet I distinctly remember many of its features and the visitors who strolled about in their finery. Women in the best horticultural circles of the day were dressed in high fashion, not the kind of casual wear we see today. The gentlemen had waistcoats, neck-ties and cravats, tan-shoes and white woolen socks. The ladies spoke of rare and interesting plants, famous house parties in Montenotte, and where in the English Market it

was possible to find the best duck pate, out-of-season raspberries, and little variegated chocolates of local gossip. The men as ever relied on conversational pieces which included golf 'at the island', billiards as opposed to snooker, how best to be proposed as a member of the Cork and County Club and those new fangled Austin Cambridge cars. Their grandeur in every respect is not of now.

Features within the garden included a long yew walk containing a dozen and more topiary-castellated archways, a great flight of grass steps immaculately cut and superbly maintained, a large natural rockery full of the rarest and finest alpines, mature trees and shrubs, a stream and bog garden, tennis courts, gate lodge and stone wall boundaries.

In this garden was summer, perpetual summer or so it seemed, but nothing animal, vegetable or mineral can occupy a time beyond their span, and what was so lovingly created was soon destined to carry the peculiar beauty of picturesque decline. Many of the trees and shrubs imported from Kew Gardens in London (Beamish has close connections with Kew and his garden profited largely from these associations) went into decline following the sale of Harmony Lodge to a commercial venture. Later again it changed hands and is now used by the government as a Direct Provision

There are no gardeners now at Ashbourne House, neither any visible garden maintenance apart from some grass cutting. Birds no longer seem to nest among the shrubs and apart from a few aggressive rooks nesting in the high canopies all is unusually quiet. The only noise I hear whilst strolling the outer walls is from the wind which blows wild and free among dead branches. Whither now I wonder the great yew-tree walk, the rockery and water garden, the magnificent flight of grass steps, aged magnolias and choice shrubs from the Antipodes and beyond? All seems lost. A garden I believe cannot retain its idiosyncrasies and individualities when it passes from private to institutional ownership.

THE SEPTEMBER GARDEN

AUTUMN; Every now and again throughout the entire month of September I seem to envy the gardeners on the Mediterranean! Long after the autumn equinox, when we have all closed the back door, lit the outside lamps, and started supper, they will still be outside eating and drinking wine amid the perfume of lilies, lavender, and santolina, still warm from the setting sun. While our gardens are being nightly draped and corseted with inescapable spiders' webs, they will be enjoying warm breezes wafting gently through pots of scented geraniums.

And like many gardeners in these latitudes I too, have to struggle with autumn's arrival, fearful of letting go whilst still clutching with a tenacious grasp to summer's light and fullness. This autumn thing is a huge 'interruption' but it is also an important aspect of our ever-changing seasons. From September 23rd the light and temperatures will surely dip further but I shall embrace the late season blooms whilst anticipating the arrival of coloured leaves, dewy mornings and days made for the planting of spring

FLOWERS; Everything that grew during summer is now producing seed or dried flower heads and many can be harvested for indoor use over winter. In particular, hydrangeas will be found excellent when dried, so too, allium seedheads, the prickly blooms of the biennial Dipsacus (Teasel), Lunaria (Honesty), Echinacea (Cone flower), Stipa gigantea and many more. A bevy of fresh flowers will be available up to the end of November so as one delightful season gets separated from another let's say goodbye to the last of the warm sunny days and welcome with easy abandon the energising chill in the air, and a slower pace of life.

HIBISCUS; By the time you are reading this, it may well be wet and gloomy but as I write, a warm sun is shining and the sour drone of marauding wasps still fill the garden area nearest the kitchen. Their attention is now centred on a spreading bush of Hibiscus syracius 'Blue Boy'. This particular plant has been on its 'last chance' this summer, for each

year at this end of season time it would open wonderfully then turn to mush after a day or two due to continuous rain and strong winds. This year, it has performed wonderfully, opening fully and displaying not alone its satin blue petals but magnificent innerpetal markings of dark maroon. Each bloom boasts a colourful, prominent stamen which adds to the attraction of the clustered flowers. The plant, you'll have guessed, has now won a reprieve.

HELLEBORES may not be looking their best just now but any attention to feeding (with a liquid supplement) over the next few weeks will increase the quality and number of blooms come the dismal days of January and February. These have become utterly desirable in recent years and their appeal remains undimmed even by constant repetition in beds and borders. After this and during early autumn remove the scrappiest leaves to not alone tidy the plants for winter but to encourage more light reach their crowns. This action will stimulate earlier blooming especially in warm plots. Some Cork gardens open to the public for 'hellebore weekends' during January such is their popularity..


East Cork Junior A Hurling Championship QF Erins Own 2-14 St Ita's 3-16






Bogus Trades men.







I didn't realise the significance of this effort until I got a text message on my work mobile the following week:

Hi Darren, my INR was 2 3 on Tuesday so I was able to have the biopsy this morning. So many thanks for your help last week I would have had great difficulties if you had not been there for me.

Ireland has the highest rate of Meningitis B disease in Europe...

Ireland has the highest rate of Meningitis B disease in Europe... ...a new vaccine is now available Meningitis B is the leading cause of meningitis/septicaemia in Ireland..... A vaccine is now available against this deadly disease. Could this herald the end of Men B in Ireland? We cannot afford any further delay in introducing Men B vaccine- saving the lives and limbs of our children. You can help, read on to find out how.

Meningitis/septicaemia can kill in hours. Meningitis is the inflammation of the lining around the brain and spinal cord. Septicaemia is the blood poisoning form of the disease. The two forms of the disease have somewhat different symptoms, but septicaemia is more dangerous. I outlined the signs and symptoms of meningitis/septicaemia in a recent article.

Men B; The human cost. Ireland has the highest rate of Men B in Europe. Unfortunately approximately 170 people get Men B meningitis/septicaemia every year in Ireland. Children

under 5y age are at especially high risk: the peak age is babies of just five months of age. Teenagers are another high risk group. The stark figures reveal that 10% die- That's almost 20 deaths, while a further 10% have major disability, such as limb amputation, deafness and brain damage. Approximately 30% have long term psychological effects. This has a catastrophic effect on the patient, their family, community and the health service. The number of people struck with Meningitis C fell 98% when we introduced the Meningitis C vaccine over a decade ago. We know that Men B vaccine will dramatically reduce the number of cases of meningitis/septicaemia. The Men B vaccine is available in Ireland: Babies in Ireland are not getting this vaccine routinely. Men B vaccine was licenced in Ireland in Jan 2013, but only available privately. Earlier this year the National Immunisation Advisory Committee gave Men B vaccine a very positive recommendation. We are waiting, and waiting, for

the Dept. of Health to decide if, and when, to introduce this lifesaving vaccine, and protect our children. This is a race against time, to save the lives, limbs and brains of our children from a really deadly disease. Babies in the UK get the vaccine: Babies born in the UK will be offered Men B vaccine from September 2015, as part of the routine childhood vaccination programme. Babies born in Northern Ireland will get the vaccine, and be protected. Babies born in the Republic will not be routinely offered the vaccine, with predictable consequences. There is no current recommendation in UK or Ireland to vaccinate adolescents, but research is ongoing.

You can help....

We can all work to help have this vaccine introduced for our children. We are very for-

tunate in having local politicians enthusiastically engaged in health matters. Whatever your political persuasion, pick up the phone & make this an issue for your TD to address. Simply ask "When will Men B vaccine be given to babies in Glanmire?"

We all can help protect our children from this deadly disease

This month I want to write about how the stress of school can lead to serious symptoms of anxiety and depression in adolescents. 25.1% of children between the ages of 13-18 have been diagnosed with a form of anxiety disorder, while 5.9% have been diagnosed with severe anxiety, both life prevalent (source: www.ada.org). Suicide is also the third leading cause of death for people aged between 15-24. As a teenager, I believe much of this is the result of the crippling stress caused by school. Both parents and teachers alike unintentionally put so much pressure on kids to do well in school, regardless of whether academics are their strong point. School is a memory game, and not everyone can learn things so fast, much less actually understand the information they do absorb. I've talked to teenagers that confided that if they don't do well in school, they'll be a disappointment to their family. Who could love a disappointment? This level of stress results in anxious thoughts, which hinder a person's ability to learn. We go into school to be brainwashed into thinking if we don't do well then we're going to be social rejects, our very existence a waste of valuable oxygen. We're constantly told that if we can't

accomplish academically then our lives are over, that we're destined for mediocracy for the rest of our lives. Try telling Bill Gates that. Did you know that the average high school student today experiences the same levels of anxiety as the average psychiatric patient in mental institutions in the 1950s? (source: www.pyschologytoday.com). Parents usually brush aside claims of anxiety and stress by comparing it to their daily lives, which is, to put it simply, stupid. Not only is anxiety and stress relevant to the individual, but we're at a stage in our lives where we have no idea how to handle it, and haven't learned yet how to keep our heads above water. School is different now than it was when our parents went to school. Anxiety levels in school have reached an all-time high. We're constantly comparing ourselves to the kids who are smarter than us, and it makes a teenager feel like they're worthless, a waste of time. It makes their futures seem bleak. Who could blame a kid for contemplating suicide? The important thing to remember for anyone who's reading this and feels like this, is that everything they tell you is a load of bulls**t. There are other ways to accomplish what you want, and if it fails then there is always another path that you can achieve regardless of your academic abilities, and you'll love it just the same. I mean, have you

seen Monsters' Inc: Monsters' University? You don't have to decide your life right now. Take your time, try your hardest to achieve the grades you're capable of, and if you don't do well, you are not a failure. You have other strong points, and not being academic does not make you less than anyone else. If you're a parent, or a teacher, and you're reading this, I urge you to have some compassion for us kids. Don't lead us to believe our self-worth is based entirely on school work. I mean, Bill Gates never finished school, and I'm no professional but he seems to be doing okay for himself. Everything will be okay. If you want to increase your grades for your own happiness, then talk to your parents and your school for a little extra help. I'm sure they will be more than happy to oblige. It could just be a simple matter of picking up things at a different pace than the school curriculum is being taught at. If you're suffering from school related anxiety or depression, talk to your guidance counsellor. Don't let a silly thing like school get you down!
