
The prize giving took place on 13th November in the Credit Union and the winners go forward to represent Glanmire & District Credit Union Ltd at Cork Chapter level.

Caherlag Graveyard: The directional signpost erected at Caherlag provides an additional feature, yet it should have been much better positioned. Also, the burial ground has always been known as; Caherlag Graveyard, not Cemetery, and is identified as such on the entrance pillars, as well as on the nearby heritage board. There is much deliberation nowadays regarding the differential descriptive, not just relative to Caherlag, but in general. The understanding is that a graveyard, unlike a cemetery, is located within church grounds. However that is the technical aspect but people today use the descriptions interchangeably. If for instance the foregoing was applied; the burial ground at Midleton would be described as a graveyard, whereas it is traditionally called a cemetery, and there are many similar examples. The description; cemetery is of a relatively modern usage and it conjures up an image of orderly, straight pleasing rows of gravesites. One obvious example of this is St. Josephs Cemetery, Little Island. On the other hand the description graveyard is more archaic and it portrays an ancient historical resting place; of high walls, an iron gate, varying size headstones, some slanted and with the inscriptions almost worn down by time and weather, and also low uninscribed grave markers. Caherlag has all of these characteristics. It should also be noted that it is the site of the ancient parish church where religious ceremonies were held from at least the twelfth century. The church ceased to be a place of worship for the catholic population during the reformation, and in the 1641 rebellion the building was partly demolished. Therefore, taking such a technicality route the description; graveyard is appropriate, but most important; the overriding factor is that locally the burial ground has always been referred to as a graveyard. Then, the word cemetery is misspelled on the signpost! Who is familiar with "Pudsy's Diary in "The Far East"? This is a magazine which is published monthly by the Columban Fathers, who were established to spread the gospel in China, and the publication was particularly popular in bygone days when it was promoted through the schools. Adults read articles on Irish priests who work as missionaries in the unknown corner of Asia, but the children's favourite was always, and perhaps still is, the character Pudsy's stories on his exploits much nearer home. His misspelling is a feature and the following is an example from a recent issue; "Lass Satirday mum askd me to dust the sittin room". There is a flavour of this with the signpost, and in the next issue of "The Far East" Pudsy may remark that; "de nu sine at kaher log shud reed grave yard"!

The Parish Pumps: How many are aware that U.N. World Water Day is held on March 22nd.each year? Ireland is of course already promoting the natural resource day event by way of well organised nationwide marches and rallies! Running water is very much taken

for granted in todays' home, because all that is required is just a simple turn of a tap. This of course was not always the case, and pumps, wells and barrels of rainwater were used in times prior to this. Some pumps, belonging to that era, are still visible in our countryside, including our own neighbourhood. They serve as a reminder of the harsh days gone by when the Bean an Tí, never Fear an Tí, was regularly seen ambling along the roads with her white enamel bucket. The pump was the focal point of rural Ireland then, and additionally it provided the only water supply, as well as offering a meeting place for communities. Running water was installed in the majority of homes during the fifties, and even the sixties, but in some cases only as far as the back door, especially at privately owned dwellings. A tap attached to a lead pipe and secured to a timber upright was a common sight. In the mid-fifties local authority houses were built on the roadside between Burys Bridge and Glanmire, road L 2988, and it was the following decade when running water was installed. In the interim residents were dependent on a pump located a few hundred metres away. Another pump was located further along that road, near the T Junction adjacent to The Rectory. There were many other such pumps elsewhere including numerous at Little Island. There was for example one adjacent to the twelve Lough Mahon Terrace houses which were constructed at Clash Road around 1938. This served as a source of water for the residents and their neighbours. Four local authority houses were also constructed at the end of Courtstown Road in 1950, and again there was a pump on the roadside nearby. Pumps were located on the road which runs eastward from the Island Cross towards the cemetery, road L 2986, and the only surviving one, albeit in a halfconcealed fashion, is on the boundary wall of the Meadow Lawn Estate. Residents of houses in that area utilised these pumps. There were also other pumps located at the western side of Little Island which served houses there; however the fifty local authority houses at St. Lappans Place had running water installed during construction. The blessing and dedication of these houses, to the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Lappan, was performed by Very Rev. Canon P. O' Leary on Sunday July 3rd.1955. In the mid-forties the local authority constructed six houses on the Back Road at Glounthaune, but running water was not installed until the late fifties. Meantime the residents of these and the other houses nearby sourced water from a pump which was located at the western end of the road. This green cylindrical pump was plus three feet in height and had a syphon pipe fitting encased. There was a notch at the spout to support a bucket, and the pump was operated by an up-down movement of its doglegtype handle. These unique pumps were usually positioned in a semi enclosed concrete- walled surround platform,

two steps high of ground level. Similar

pumps were located at; Windsor Hill Crossroads, Caherlag, Ballinglanna, and at the T Junction on the Rougrane Road. A different type pump, but similar to those already referred to, was located at the southern side of the Dry Bridge. In past times this pump acted as a valuable supply source for those residing at the other side of the roadway. The surrounding road level was raised over the years as a result of resurfacing, but the pump, which is still in-situ, was never adjusted accordingly. This has resulted in a sizeable section below ground, and the visual attraction would be improved immensely if this was rectified. There were also two cast iron pumps in The Village, and these were operated by turning a knob handle which rotated the chain inside. The pump at the western end was very much in demand at half time of the popular hurling games which were played at the nearby Small Field. In the late sixties Cork County Council removed this pump and replaced it with a tap, but when the residents complained the original was returned with a tap fitted. This was an admirable example of excellent judgment by those residents of forty fifty years ago. The pump at the eastern end was incorporated as a feature at the green open space created by the Glounthaune Development Association in 1968. Previous to this there was an approx. three foot high wall running from the extreme right of the Parochial House entrance gate pillar-wall, which continued on a curved course to the rear of the pump, and extended in a south-westerly direction to approx. four feet beyond. The pump was inconspicuous then, but following the demolition of this backdrop wall, and with infill to road level of a tract of land at its rear, seeding of same, as well as the provision of seating and kerbing; it was consequently presented in a prominent and pleasant setting, as is today. The then significant costs incurred, including the construction of a retaining block wall, were borne by the Development Association. By the way, there was a miniscule ruin, which was known locally as; "The Castle", located at the western side of the adjacent quay wall. It was once transformed into a rock garden but was levelled when the green open space was developed. In hindsight, even though a remnant, this was unfortunate but of course such was not viewed with significance back then. It is not known at present what the historical background to "The Castle" is, but residents of old were known to recollect that notices of impending court cases were displayed thereon. In past times there was a courtroom upstairs of the present "Rising Tide" premises

which was accessed via exterior concrete steps at the western gable wall. Some local organisations held meetings there subsequently, and the steps were demolished when the building was renovated in the mid-sixties. There

was another pump engraved; "Merrick Cork" adjacent to Fitzpatrick's Shop and in bygone days the residents of the nearby houses utilised this. The pump, with a tap fitting later installed, was evidently manufactured by the foundry firm; Robert Merrick & Sons Cork, and in those days the company promoted its business as; "Warren's Place Ironworks". This was derived from their location, as Warren's Place was one of three historically known names of Parnell Place; the others were Cold Harbour and Nelson's Quay. Their premises were located where the popular Chinese restaurant "Panda Mama" is currently, and in fact there is a limestone street

name plaque; "Nelson's Quay" visible on the wall above the entrance door of the restaurant. Merrick's was founded circa 1853 and engaged in ironwork and engineering of every description including; steam and gas engines, threshing machines, pulleys, water wheels, pumps, and the company also manufactured carriages and engines for the famous Muskerry Tram. The aforementioned pumps are just a few examples of those that were positioned around our locality, but of course there were many, many more. An interesting exercise would be to recollect their locations, and this would also offer a good indication of the actual number. There were, as mentioned, numerous at Little

Island and apart from the one that is somewhat defaced in order to enhance the wall at Meadow Lawn Estate; is the pump adjacent to Lough Mahon Terrace the only one surviving? It is regrettable that there are so few of those precious emblems of past times evident in our parish today. However it is pleasing to observe that two are still in good working order; the one located at the western end of The Village, and the one adjacent to Fitzpatrick's Shop. SLÁNOIS ©

This helped greatly to raise awarness of metal health issues, and to raise awareness of the free services that are available to those who are suffering. Christmas time can be difficult for families and loved ones dealing with the aftermath of suicide. As well as helping those dealing with mental health issues, Pieta



House also provide services and counselling to families trying to deal with a tragic loss.

A cheque fo € 30,011 was presented to Pieta House at their Bishopstown centre on the 24th of November 2014. All the monies raised will be used to fund services locally at the Pieta

House Cork. Pieta House now has a staff of over 170 and the demand for services hasn't let up. In 2013, nearly 4,000 people came to Pieta House for help and the numbers are rising all the time. 
THE GARDEN SHED My refuge is a bolt-hole half hidden by a tall evergreen in a sheltered part of the back garden. I 'escape' to it whenever the need arises. There are thousands more in gardens all over the country. Mine stores among other things, my tools and gardening essentials, my expectations and dreams, and a deep ocean of memories! Like a bedroom dressing table it's a place for silent reflection, of quiet and warmth, away from the depressing January weather and those frightfully cold winds. Some would call

the structure a greenhouse even though it started out a long time ago as a wooden workshop. There has always been a tradition in our extended family for having some sort of recreational sanctuary into which a person could abscond for long or short periods. Normally, such places are where people store their household DIY tools, and run to put the canvas chairs when it looks like rain in summer. My thinking is that if the garden is a place of refuge, then a hide of some sort can be a haven within it. I offer you a peep into my inner sanctum! On a tottering shelf on the back wall there's a rickety old cardboard box simply bulging at the corners. It is a depository of good intentions, crammed with packets of vegetable and flower seed. Sometime around the middle of February I'll probably come home with another set of duplicates having forgotten what was and wasn't there, and sort through the whole container yet again whilst marvelling at my Swede turnip collection and tomato archive. They'll be sorted into piles of what should be planted immediately, and what can wait until next week, next month and so on. None, I dare say will ever feel the heat of the summer sun and gentle rain except perhaps for small pinches of the lettuce 'Susan' every now and again. From this you will gather that a little salve goes a long way with my

conscience! There are garden tools, ceramic pots, and overwintering plants everywhere and these, standing or stacked take up much of the available floor space. A collection of now withdrawn chemicals occupy a dark spider-filled recess beneath a homemade potting table while hanks of raffia, green garden twine and faded dried lavender hang from the roof beams. An earthy, pleasant smell lingers in the air but once the pewter-coloured sun heats the structure it disappears like morning dew. Would you like your own private bolt-hole? Imagine being able to leave the fog and the frost, the drizzle and the depressing dreariness of an Irish post-Christmas winter and retreat to a small ready-made structure! Wishful thinking? I think about all these when I should be otherwise engaged, and flick through catalogues like a man looking for life-saving advice. For the life of me, I can't imagine how non-gardeners

get through life. What do they do for thrills? Go to the pub? It may be but the second week of a brand new year but the heady joys of planning and plotting are already tossing about in my mind, jostling with the greedy anticipation of yet another season, another beginning.

beginning. BULBS; I'm watching for emerging bulbs! At ground level, the first pale shoots of snowdrops are trusting through the dark leaf-mould and it won't be long before these and varieties of crocus are up and in full bloom. Some are fattening in readiness but the real blooming won't be for another few weeks, early February at the latest. Later again there will be pools of blue and white chinodoxa, primroses, more bronze and purple crocus, lilac and lavenderpink erythroniums, and gold, lemon, and cream narcissus. Wishful thinking (yet again) but already, as you can see, I'm moving in my thoughts into spring. What marvellous times we gardeners have to look forward to!

WISTERIA; In Riverstown and Glanmire remember to give wisteria its winter prune. All those long growths, shortened in summer to eight inches or so, should be cut back now to stubs of three inches, or to within two buds of their base. This builds up short flowering spurs all along the main framework of stems already tied in to the wall or support. Anyone worried about lack of blooms should attend to this pruning before

After nearly 30 years of waiting, construction has finally begun on a new Scout Hall for the 46th/ 92nd Cork (Glanmire) Scout Troop. Located in the area of Old Avenue, just off Hazelwood Road, the 247 m2 building will contain a main hall, conference room, store room, kitchen, and a patrol meeting room. Also the outside area will have a camping area.

Work began on August 18th and Oakfield Construction of Glanmire are the main contractors. It is planned that the build will take approximately 21 weeks and will be completed by mid February 2015.

This is a major mile stone in the history of the Scout Group. The Group started from humble beginnings in 1979 and has grown to be one of the biggest scout groups

in Cork. At the present time we have 156 youth members supported by 23 adult scouters,we operate 2 beaver sections, 2 cub sections, a scout troop, a venture unit, and a rover crew.Since 1979 we have been using various halls around Glanmire such as the National School, The Community Centre, and the Local GAA halls. Also in 1989 the Kelleher family gave us the use of "The Lodge" in Butlerstown, this facility greatly added to the outdoor programme of the group and we are very grateful to the Kellehers for that.It is a fact that without the friendship and support of these Local organisations and the Kellehers, the Scout Group would not have been able to func-

A Project of this magnitude would not be possible without sufficient funds, the

group over the years has managed to do some fund raising however the project would not have been able to start without the financial support of Glanmire Parish . We would like to publicly acknowledge and thank the Parish Priest in Glanmire, Fr Newman and the members of the Parish finance committee for their help and support .We would also like to comfirm that ALDI Stores are not building the hall for us . The scout Group is financing the project from savings amassed over the years and from the generous support of the Parish. At the present time we have a funding gap of 40,0000, This is to complete the internal finish of the hall and to complete the outside works. This includes the perimeter fence and a storm attenuation tank. With this in mind we have embarked on a fund raising campaign . A fund raising committee has been formed and one of the first steps was to contact local businesses in Glanmire looking for support .Ryan's Supervalu in Glanmire were the first to pledge their support to our fund raising effort. They have a proud record of supporting local clubs and voluntary groups in Glanmire so we look forward to working with them We also have applied to Cork County Council for an amenity grant.

As we start the new scouting year there is a lot of excitement and hope around the group. There is still some work to be done with fund raising but we are confident that we will reach our target and get our hall finished on time and on budget. After our long wait, Scouting in Glanmire will finally have a place to call home.



Chaperones

What are they, and why are they necessary?

"Would you like someone to accompany you during your visit to the doctor/nurse?" Should you require a chaperone during your consultation, examination or procedure please ask your doctor, nurse or reception staff for information on chaperones.

Doctors, nurses and all healthcare professionals are committed to providing a safe environment for patients. The recent care home scandal in Mayo has emphasised how important it is to ensure that patients are treated with respect and dignity at all times.

A chaperone is a person, preferably a nurse or doctor, who is present during certain

physical examinations or procedures. The doctor/nurse should clearly explain why a particular examination or procedure is necessary. This can help promote understanding and acceptance of the need for a particular examination. Chaperones are available both in general practice and hospitals.

Most doctors will offer a chaperone during "intimate" examinations, which includes rectal/ male and female genital examination, and can also include breast examination. In some instances a chaperone may be offered even for a "standard" physical examination. The Îrish College of GPs, and the Medical Council, both recommend that doctors/nurses should OFFER a chaperone for all intimate examinations. It is considered good practice to

OFFER a chaperone. Research has shown that most patients value the offer of a chaperone, but most then choose NOT to have a chaperone present. The chaperone should ideally be another health care professional. This is a relatively new departure. In the past a friend/family member often acted as a chaperone. It is now recognised that a friend may not understand the nature or purpose of the examination, and lacks appropriate training. It is very important to understand that a friend/ family member may ALSO be present, to offer support, comfort and reassurance to the patient. This is perfectly

acceptable. A health care professional is the ideal chaperone.

Many GP surgeries and hospitals now have chaperone policies. This helps ensure that patients are treated with respect and dignity at all times, especially when at their most vulnerable. Talk to your doctor/nurse about chaperones. If you would like a chaperone present please ask.

January Recipe: Sausage Plait

Pastry

1 block of bought puff pastry Method

Mix together all the dry ingredients.

Bring together with the tomato sauce and puree.

Roll out pastry into an oblong shape.

Place sausage mixture in the centre. Place thinly sliced tomato along

the top. Cut diagonal strips down both sides,

stopping about an inch out from the meat

Overlap the strips to form a plait. Bake in the middle of the oven at around 160 degrees

(It is better to do this slowly to make sure the meat cooks right through)





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

A 10 minute appointment last Wednesday allowed us to identify areas they needed improving and allowed us to give the best advice possible, to boost their good cholesterol, lower their bad cholesterol, blood pressure and triglyceride levels and therefore have a huge impact on their risk of heart disease.



Our test identified their risk of heart disease as 5% at the moment. Once they have finished with our nutrition clinic in January they will have a food plan that will be full of flavour yet kind to their hips their risk of heart disease this time next year their risk will be 1.9%!





As promised here is the update of our efforts/participation in the competition, and result of our project at The Hazelwood Road. *Following is an extract of the entry application:*



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Ouestion

I will be retiring from work in 2015 when I reach 65. What do I need to know about pensions and other benefits in retirement?

Answer

When you retire at age 65 you can claim Jobseeker's Benefit, which is based on your Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contributions. If you do not qualify for Jobseeker's Benefit you can claim Jobseeker's Allowance, which is a means-tested payment.

At age 66, you may be entitled to the State Pension (Contributory). If you do not have enough PRSI contributions, you can apply for a State Pension (Non-Contributory), which is means-tested. You should apply for State pensions at least three months in advance.

You may have contributed to an occupational pension scheme during your working life or you may have a personal pension arrangement. You need to contact the pension provider to find out exactly what benefits your pension gives you.

If you move from employment to retirement in the course of the year, you should get a PAYE Balancing Statement (P21) from your local tax office at the end of the year. This will trigger a refund of any overpayment of tax you might have made.

Your Jobseeker's Benefit or State

pension and any occupational pension are taxable. However, the tax exemption limits are much higher for people aged 65 or over and there are some extra tax credits.

At age 66 you will be exempt from paying PRSI. At age 70 you will pay a reduced Universal Social Charge if your annual income is €60,000 or less

At age 66 you will also be eligible for a Free Travel Pass and may be eligible for the Household Benefits Package, which consists of a free TV licence and an electricity or gas allowance.

For medical cards and GP Visit Cards, which are means tested, the income limits are higher for people aged 70 and over.

Age Action helps to prevent this type of crime by keeping a list of reliable tradesmen who can provide quotations for jobs and won't rip people off.

Regional Manager John O'Mahony says that the list of tradesmen is particularly helpful at this time of year. "People prepare for the winter by getting work done such as boiler services, chimney cleans, gutter clearances, repairs to damaged roof tiles or heating systems. At Age Action we keep a list of reliable tradesmen who will do these jobs at reasonable prices. This ensures that older people won't be ripped off when they employ people to work in their homes."

"We also have volunteers who can do smaller jobs for people free of charge. At this time of year we get

Minutes of the Public Meeting held on Monday 8th December 2014

Attendance: A number of interested local People.

Apologies: Cllr. Padraig O'Sullivan M.C.C. Mary Nott, Carol Carey

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and signed

Matters arising: Anti-Social behavior on the Aldi's premises was reported to be continuing to some extent.

Correspondence: The letters and e-mails read and noted. Letter sent to Southern Regional Drug and Alcohol Task Force Re Anti-Social behaviour at the access to the sports pitches. Letter sent to Maywood Ltd RE Litter around their property i.e. library and surrounding premises. We received a letter from Mr. O'Hara Re the cleaning of Gullies in Riverstown Village, he stated that the gullies are cleaned regularly but they cannot always clean them. It was decided that a letter needs to be sent noting that while the leaves had been cleaned, the gully traps had not been fully emptied.

Sports Ground: it was reported that an application would be lodged by the engineer hopefully before Christmas to change the conditions of entry in Forest Park. Path from school to pitches discussed, problem of probable Anti-social activity noted. The GACA are pushing the County Council to clean up the trees and bushes along the path for better visibility. It was reported that there is a litter problem arising in Brooklodge Estate due to no refuse bins provided for litter. Brooklodge Residents Association asked that a letter be written to GCC RE their students and issues with littering. The grounds committee to provide a bin at the gate to the path.

House Management: The topic of mending the community centre roof and costs were discussed, at present the GACA are applying for grants and discussing how to raise funds to repair the roof

Community Garden: It was reported that the community gardens are doing well, and that the construction work is not interfering with the garden.

Indoor bowls: Mary Nott sends Apologies. It was reported that the club received a grant of €270 in joint application with the seniors.

Seniors: The seniors are joining up with the active retirement group for

Christmas Dinner at the Metropole Hotel. The seniors will also have Christmas lunch in the Elm Tree on the 16th December. It was also reported that the 16th December would be the last session for the chiropodist this year.

Heritage: It was reported that there is no new information on the Alms Houses. Rathcooney Graveyard work is still ongoing. The County Council is launching a book on December 19th about Local Heritage Houses, in which Riverstown House will be featured.

Tidy Towns: It was reported that they find it necessary to clean up private property at the back of the library, which they should not have to do. A letter was sent to Maywood Ltd, RE their obligation to clean up their premises. It was reported that Tidy Towns work 2 days a week with volunteers from GCC for the GAISCE award, Saturday mornings and 2 hours on a Monday, for sweeping and litter picking etc. it was reported that they are thinking of entering Glanmire Village in Tidy Towns in 2015

Glanmire Environmental Committee: By agreement with the GEC Tidy Towns will get access to the container in the soccer pitch, which will be used by Tidy Towns for storage etc. The secretary of GACA was asked to contact Mr. O'Hara about a drain/sewerage problem that has arisen in Brooklodge Estate.

Car boot Sale: It was reported that the community stall went very well. Thanks for all the great things donated. Please keep the donations coming.

Allotments: It was reported that Daniel Lehane and Ger Keohane will take over the running of the Allotments, as soon as the land is made available from the NRA.

Environmental Problems: Notices on Meaneys Site state that plans for a 1,200 sq meter Retail space is planned to be built there, plus all ancillary building giving a total of about 2,000sq meter (or 20,000sq.ft)

A.O.B. Sympathies to Kathleen Moloney and family on the death of her grandson.

It was reported that the NRA cut down a huge amount of trees on the motorway from Dunkettle to the turn off to Glanmire. The cutting had been carried out in a vandalistic manner, and noise and visual amenity had been reduced along the motorway.
