At 2 o'clock the boatmen will be ready to take us down the river and along the lake to Muckross House.


The coach will be there to meet us and take us back to Hazelwood for about 6.30.

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

PUBLIC LIGHTING:

The vandalism, in the guise of essential road improvement, to the beautiful wide open cobblestone stream at the Back Road rear of Ashbourne was referenced in the August 2010 issue of Area News. The stream, which partly flowed into the Lily Pond during the Ashbourne glory days, was where the local children paddled in its clear water many years ago. Generations of Thaunies also experienced the calm and relaxing nature of tranquility as they absorbed the characteristic running stream sound when they leisurely walked by. Then the perpetrator Cork County Council, not a local celebrity star, converted the gem in our midst into an ugly man-made concrete roadside drain. As mentioned, road-widening purpose was the reason given back then, but the reality as may be observed today is that a rat run was created which acts as a link to the "Caherlag Highway", and its lay-out is such that it is also convenient for HGV traffic. The article suggested that; "perhaps an essential footpath westwards from the station would have been a more worthwhile project". Well, the laying of a footpath at the northern side of that road commenced in late 2011 and it is notable that when the road was constructed in the late fifties the footpath was on the southern side. It was at road level and consisted of a limited thinly distributed quantity of tar, with a layer of green coloured gravel. A grass verge separated the foot-path from the road but, due to lack of maintenance, nature encroached over the years as the verge enlarged and engulfed the footpath. The 2011 laid path is a welcome safety feature and is of particular benefit to rail commuters. However crossing the road at the station is hazardous and this is an issue which the Tidy Towns adjudicator referred to in the 2014 report; "Pedestrian facilities could certainly be

improved at the train station where there is no pedestrian crossing to reach the footpath on the other side of the road". There is also another problem at this location in so far as there is no set down area as same was replaced with a gravel topped mound in an ill-judged and selfish fashion. The set down area was convenient for parents to drop off their children to the train, and when the train service was suspended for one reason or another, the essential facility was utilised by the replacement bus service. The removal of the set-down area has led to a safety hazard as vehicles are now obliged to stop on the roadway, and passing traffic is compelled to overtake in a dangerous manner at a perilous location. The footpath is very popular for night-time usage – the "Old Road" is an alternative in daylight hours - but the fact that public lighting was not installed at the time was a "glaring" neglect. Was it considered? Was it because of the unavailability of funds? Was it due to the fact that there was no liaison between the service providers as they may not have wished to share the "spotlight"?! At the very least, ducting should have

been laid in preparation for the installation of lighting at a future date. On Friday October 3rd. 2014 work commenced on the provision of public lighting on the stretch of main road from a point opposite the eastern end of Johnstown Park to west of "The Tree". However it is mystifying why the seven lighting units between the Waterside Apartment Block and The Station were not positioned at the footpath side of the road. Did the genius who planned this operate from a sixties map back at the office? The result is that the light beam gives excellent luminance to the wide grass verge at that side of the road, but this is at the expense of the essential lighting needs of the footpath at the other side. Cork County Council Policy Guidelines relative to public lighting state that; "lighting should be designed in a manner that both the vehicular carriageway and pedestrian path are sufficiently illuminated". Relative to pedestrian safety the document states that; "oncoming vehicles and bicycles must be easily recognised by pedestrians. It has to be possible for pedestrians to discern the features and intentions of a person who approaches them at night. The distribution of lighting must be such that sufficient light falls on the faces of these persons". Well the positioning of the seven lighting units in question is at complete variance to the foregoing. Also, aside from the pedestrian safety aspect; if the units were positioned at the obvious location on the footpath side, the adjacent pond would then be presented in a pleasant night-time setting, and would enhance the area. The work pertaining to the footpath and lighting, or ducting, should have been carried out simultaneously, but when this was "overlooked" the lighting units could still have been erected subsequently at the footpath side. It should have been possible to lay ducting at the pond side of the path, and this would have avoided the necessity of excavating it. The matter should be addressed even at this late stage. For example; would the fitting of an outreach arm to each of the seven lighting units in question, at the recommended tilt of five degrees, rectify the problem? The Cork County Council Policy Guidelines relative to single side lighting arrangement state that: "An increase in the angle of an outreach arm increases the luminance

sional. A total of twenty two lighting units were installed on the main road, and a further two on the roadside near the infamous "Concrete Way By-Pass" near Ashbourne. In addition, eight lights on exist-

ing poles adjacent to the church were replaced, but a glorious opportunity to discard the over-head unsightly wires-cape was not availed of. One light at the entrance to Glounthaune Village was replaced but the provision of additional lighting there was ignored. The village is a dark secluded area and for example; a light near the pump at the western end would be of great benefit. Also, the unattractive botched tree on the grounds of the Community Centre, south east of the building and alongside a lighting unit positioned on the public road, should be removed as it is blocking light to the public road area. Also, the adjacent tree outside the boundary wall should be topped and trimmed. Incidentally the regulation is that trees should not be planted within five metres of a public light column. There are three lighting units at the footpath side between the church and the approach to Fitzpatrick's Shop, and another three are positioned at the parking area opposite. There is logic to this. There are nine units from the station eastwards and these are on the opposite side to the hard shoulder. They are positioned where a footpath was previously in place, and in fact it extended as far as the Elm Tree. It was similar to the one already referred to at the southern side of the roadway west of the station. This path at the eastern side was also laid during road construction works in the late fifties but, again due to lack of maintenance, it suffered the same fate as the other path because the grass verge enlarged and engulfed this one as well. It must of course be acknowledged that the provision of public lighting is an excellent safety feature and our area has benefited as a result, but the foregoing, pardon the pun, "highlights" the fact that one sec-

tion should have been installed in a more effective fashion. The provision of such an extent of public lighting came as a pleasant surprise as there was no prior knowledge, unless it was kept a secret! It must have surprised the local politicians also because they would have been pleased to broadcast the good news in advance, and perhaps claim credit! The Cork County Council Policy Guidelines state that; "Well maintained road lighting can change our communities and make the night time environment a safer place to be". The positioning of such lighting alongside a footpath would certainly be a worthwhile and prudent project in this regard.



BLACK-TAILED GODWIT

The ornamental replica bird which the Community Association sited at the eastern end of the "Old Road" is admirable and appropriate. One of the most important high tide roosts on the south coast of Ireland for the Black-Tailed Godwit is Harper's Island, and as many as one thousand, eight hundred of the world's population of sixty thousand may occasionally be there. Their favourite feeding spot is the nearby mudflats and as the flood tide covers the mud they, as well as those at other areas of the harbour, retreat to their roost at Harper's Island as they feel safe there. They return to the mudflats when the tide has ebbed. Studies have shown that the Black-Tailed Godwits here have also been to Portugal, France, Holland, many parts of the United Kingdom, and Iceland. They store energy in the form of fat and they use this for their migration flight to Iceland, where the eighteen thousand that winter in Ireland breed in the wet grassland and marshes. That is in the March or April period and they return in autumn or early winter. The overall global population is estimated to be declining at such a rate that this distinct subspecies qualifies as; near threatened. Incidentally the age of the oldest known bird is twenty three vears. Glounthaune is one of the most important areas in Cork Harbour for Black-Tailed Godwit and indeed for other wetland birds also, so it is pleasing that it is recognised and promoted in the form of the recently erected emblem. Let's hope the bird will not "fly away"!

For years now, gardeners here in Glanmire and Riverstown have been deprived of an aspect of winter and early spring that no longer enhances their creations-snow. If it falls at all it is not for long. It usually falls for an hour or so in the early afternoon, and by teatime it is completely gone. And yet in recent weeks we all awoke to bedrooms full of light and eerie stillness. Outside our bungalow the busy arterial road was bereft of noise and traffic, or so I thought. Rushing to the window, the sight that greeted my eye was breath-taking. The church, road, roofs, and distant hills were cleansed as far as the horizon. This was no mere dusting. This was a fat cushiony fall of great thoroughness. Snow had outlined the detail of every twig and branch on the large rhododendron and all garden shrubs. It had coated and covered every blade of grass, every perennial, and every arching leaf of the variegated Cordylines lining the long bed of snowsmothered forget-me-nots. An absolute silence muffled the urban murmurings. Cars and trucks, panting at the traffic lights from the long steep climb from the valley below were ever so slow to move away, for beneath their wheels the snow was ground and polished to a dangerous slippery shine. I moved outside to the wonders of snow. I

marvelled and listened. There was that eerie snow hush that you associate with Christmas, but above all was the wonderful crispness and blinding brightness. Around the garden boundary, a bevelled crust of snow lay along the walls and collars of white lay snug and tightly packed around the large box balls on the driveway. Near the patio, crests of windblown snow, marbled by the gusts, annexed pots and seats, while in the distance, ominous cracking sounds told of branches straining under the weight of snow. My breath rose in plumes and though the freezing air began to deaden fingers and toes, I persisted with the inspection, enjoying the miraculous transformation. How I lament the loss of snow in recent years! Such weather is no longer part of winter as it used to be

when I was a much younger man. Then, on some rare occasions we were 'snowed in' for days but because our hilly home was always liable to suffer isolation (as a result of such icy conditions) no-one panicked. We simply altered pace and lived in seclusion at the tempo of falling snow. And so it was. When the thaw finally came bringing down great slabs slithering from the conservatory roof it left paths with brown troughs of freezing cold water which needed immediate removal. The green-house looked as if a tidal wave had washed over it but inside, all was snug and unaffected. Now and then there would be the whooshing sound of branches in the neighbouring gardens being released from their burdens. The magic was ending. For the gardener with a good collection of plants a

thaw is a time full of apprehension. What is drowning in the cold and wet? What has collapsed overnight in the blizzard conditions? What is lost forever? And yet snow has its beneficial side. Its blanketing comfort will protect certain plants from icy gales and many things will survive beneath its cover. And miraculously, from beneath its white duvet, early bulbs rise pristine and unblemished. Even the polyanthus, straining under the weight of hundreds of 'weightless' snow-flakes seem to rise once more to the occasion. Yes, the quietude and the quirkiness of spring snow must be beyond reproach. Would we have it any other way? As we approach St. Patrick's Day I often think that a white one is more likely than any around the Christmas period. Let's wait and see.







GOUT A COMMON AND VERY PAINFUL AFFLICTION

Gout is a type of intermittent arthritis. It's actually the commonest form of arthritis. Who, why and where? Gout is commoner in men, especially middle aged and older. It is more common in people who are overweight, or have diabetes. Attacks of gout often begin in the middle of the night. Gout is caused by a build up of a natural chemical called uric acid. This is normally dissolved in the blood. In some people the level of uric acid is too high, and it forms tiny sharp crystals in the joint. In general the higher the level of uric acid in the blood, the more likely gout is to occur. Once gout starts, attacks gradually get more frequent and more painful.

The big toe is most commonly affected, but the fingers and knees may also be painful. The weight of bedclothes may exacerbate the pain. The affected great toe joint is red, shiny and swollen, and the person hobbles about. The pain in gout is due to formation of tiny uric acid crystals in the joint. Just imagine hundreds of tiny sharp needles, stabbing the inside of your joint. Left untreated the gout gradually settles after a week.... But who wants to wait!

Some people are more likely to get gout. Certain foods such as oily fish and organ meats (liver, heart) are especially likely to cause gout. However most red meat, poultry and seafood predispose to developing gout; Less is more!

Fruit juices and soft drinks also contribute to the development of gout. Alcohol, especially beer, makes it harder for the kidneys to eliminate uric acid. The typical triggers for gout are a holiday in sunny Spain: sweating, dehydration, and overindulgence in red meat, seafood and alcohol. Some medicines can precipitate an attack of gout-ask your GP. Diagnosis of gout is usually done with a blood test, in combination with the typical symptoms. Treatment;

Short term; gout often starts in the middle of the night. Antiinflammatory painkillers are essential, and may bring rapid relief. Always remember that these tablets predispose to stomach ulcers and heart attacks, so use sparingly. Colchicine is a really effective medicine for gout, often in combination with antiinflammatory medicines. On occasion your GP may also prescribe steroid tablets to help settle severe gout. Its always sensible to keep an "Emergency rescue pack" of tablets, for when the pain strikes at 3am!

Long term: Address lifestyle issues; Losing weight and drinking less alcohol may be very effective. Avoid dietary excess, especially on sun holidays when dehydration, rich diet and alcohol may precipitate gout. There is a medicine called Allopurinol which prevents gout. Your GP is likely to recommend allopurinol if you get frequent

or recurrent attacks of gout. Allopurinol helps the body eliminate uric acid, and needs to be taken for the rest of your life. A blood test is done to check your uric acid level: once this is low enough gout rarely strikes. In conclusion; gout is the commonest form of arthritis. Once you get gout, the attacks tend to get more frequent and more painful. Losing weight and addressing dietary/alcohol excess may help. Medication is very effective, both for the gout attack, and in prevention of further attacks.

O Sullivan Welcomes Progress On Development of Little Island Cross

FF Councillor Pádraig O' Sullivan has welcomed confirmation from the Senior Engineer in the Traffic and Transportation Section of Cork County Council that a grant of e280,000 has been secured to progress works on one of the busiest junctions in the county. The junction in question has been a major concern for locals for many years and progress on this project has been painfully slow. The plan entails the signalisation of the Island Cross but works must be undertaken in 2015 to avail of the e280,000 grant. For the project to proceed Cork County Council will now proceed to liaise with nearby landowners to discuss land acquisition and works will proceed pending the successful outcome of these discussions. Councillor O' Sullivan commented that the works would be most welcome as it would improve pedestrian access across the Island and regulate traffic at peak times in the morning and afternoons. Little Island has in excess of ten thousand workers and is one of the largest employment hubs in the country. It's about time the infrastructure in Little Island was improved to reflect that.

A tribute to Eileen Murphy RIP



This mixture can be easily doubled, and divided between 2 x2lb loaf tins Ingredients 1/4 pint of cold tea 90z mixed dried fruit 1 oz crushed walnuts 1 small/or 1/2 large, grated cooking apple (The grated apple is the magic secret of this recipe!) 2 eggs 4 oz soft brown sugar 8oz self-raising flour 1/2 tsp salt 1 tsp cinnamon 2oz butter

Method (1) Soak all dried fruit in tea (min 2 hrs) (2) line a 2lb loaf tin with double cake liners, and heat oven to 160 degrees (3) Sift flour, salt, cinnamon and sugar in a bowl (4) Rub in butter with fingertips (5) Add walnuts, grated apple and eggs to dried ingredients (6) Now add the soaked fruit and the remaining tea, mix very well. (7) You can now add a little extra milk or fruit juice, if you think it is too dry, this is a rather wet mixture (8) Spoon into tin(s) (9) Cook in the middle of the oven, for approx 50 min, and when cake is golden brown, and firm when a skewer/thin knitting needle comes out clean, cake is done

CENTENARY OF THE 1916 RISING

Glanmire Heritage Society, together with other Historical Societies from Cork city and county, attended a meeting at Kilmurry museum in Lissarda on 14th February 2015. The meeting was organised by Gabriel Doherty from the School of History, UCC, to discuss the centenary commemoration of the 1916 Rising and the role of the Cork Volunteers from 1916 to 1923. Many issues were discussed at the meeting, and the following are some of the suggestions:

that a comprehensive list of all memorials relating to the period 1916-1923 should be compiled by the county and city Councils who should provide all necessary assistance, including financial aid and advice, for signs to indicate sites that lie within their areas.

that the county and city Councils should establish a webpage for local heritage societies and groups.

that the Councils should support a competition for secondary and national schools, the theme of which should be the struggle for independence within the county.

that local historical societies should use the commemoration as an opportunity to foster closer links with schools, and should take the initiative in this.

that a single memorial to all the Cork Volunteers should be erected in a central location within the county.

that every effort should be made to preserve contemporary documents, photographs, etc. from this period.

that people should convey to their local representatives the importance of an adequate commemorative process in the county and city areas.

that all interested groups and individuals should send a short submission of their ideas to the county and city councils – these submissions to be sent in the first instance to Gabriel Doherty, School of History, UCC. at G.Doherty@ucc.ie

It was noted that the Cork 1916 Relatives Group had invited members of local historical societies to support their efforts to ensure an adequate centenary commemoration of the Rising.

PROPERTY OUTLOOK FOR GLANMIRE AND SURROUNDING AREAS

The outlook for the property market in Glanmire and surrounding areas is very positve and economic growth is to remain strong in 2015. Property prices are expected to rise even though the Central Bank has imposed new mortgage lending rules. Cork is most likely to obtain higher growth than Dublin, in property values for this year. Mainly due to the fact that value for money is now focused on Cork and other areas, as Dublin's property prices are quite strong. Starting the first quarter of 2015, there has been no signs that there is a slow down in demand for this area, quite the opposite.

There are a number of factors why people choose to locate in Glanmire and the surrounding areas. Development of key infrastrasture such as the Dunkettle Interchange which forms a junction to the M8 (Cork/Dublin), N25 (Cork/

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Rosslare), N40 (South Ring Road to Ballincollig direction), has a major influence as people are within minutes of a major road network.

Also, in terms of employment these areas are in close promity to major employment centres such as Little Island, Mahon and Cork City.

Areas such as Glounthaune, Little Island, Carrigtwohill, Glanmire and Watergrasshill, are highly disireable, due to all this development and close location to Cork City. Property prices are increasing due to the lack of supply and huge demand in these areas. Properties in key locations have achieved 10% above the asking price in some cases, as the supply is just not there.

Glanmire in particular has seen a huge demand and there is a particular lack of supply in all types of property from apartments to houses and sites. First time buyers can now expect to pay for a 3 bedroom semi-detached anywhere from €220,000 to €250,0000 depending on location. There are no new developments currently which is directly causing price increases, along with few new properties coming to the market. It is now time that developers start to build homes in these location, as all the ingredients are there, such as confidence in the market, huge demand and lack of supply. It must now be fiancially viable to start building. By Rena Guildea Joe Organ Auctioneers


Official Opening of the new Glanmire Youth Project premises
