NÍL AON GLEANNTAN MAR DO GLEANNTAN FÉIN " GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS by "the foreign correspondent"

"THE RAINY SEASON"! Perhaps it tempts fate to suggest that it is over but the omens are good. The "stormy season" may have passed also but of course March; "in-like a lion-out like a lamb" lies ahead. We love to "talk weather" and descriptives relative to rain include; 'sort of, but it would wet you like, 'tis bucketing, 'tis just continuous like, will it ever stop? The wind then can be; windy, blustery, there's a bit of a lightish breeze there, 'tis blowing a gale, 'tis howling, 'that north-east would go through you. The phrase; "Blowing a hoolie" is another and this derives from happenings on the River Hooghly, which is a one hundred and sixty two mile distributary of the River Ganges in West Bengal. In steamship days when vessels were unable to sail upstream due to strong winds, the captains bawled; "it's blowing a hoolie up there". The classic phrase right now of course is; "there's a grand stretch in the evenings". Ireland has experienced varied weather conditions down through the years including; the snow of 1947, the coldest on record winter of 1962/63, the remnants of Hurricane Charley in 1986 as well as that of Hurricane Katia in 2011. However the worst storm in Irish history was on Nollaig Na mBan, January 6th. 1839 when a category three hurricane reached well over one hundred and fifteen mph. Up to three hundred people died, tens of thousands were left homeless, twenty five per cent of homes in Dublin were destroyed and forty two ships were wrecked. Estimates on the cost of damage at present-day values would be well in excess of Eur two hundred and fifty million. It became known as "The Night of the Big Wind" and an interesting sidetrack is that when the then Old Age Pension was introduced in 1909, which entitled those over seventy to an allowance of five shillings per week, many Irish Catholics had no birth registration and in order to establish proof of age one of the questions asked was whether the applicant remembered; "The Night of the Big Wind"! Were "Barney", "Clodagh", "Desmond", "Eva" and "Frank" simply "storms in a teacup then"? Well comparisons have no relevance whatsoever to the plight of those affected by recent weather conditions, and to apply such would be scant consolation for the hardship, the loss and the inconvenience which they experienced. The only difference of a home flooded to a depth of three feet as against four is a mathematical one. The first occasion that homes in Glounthaune Village suffered tidal flooding was on Sunday October 21st.1962 at a period when "Hurricane Ella" was also raging in the States and Ireland, particularly Cork, experienced widespread flooding. The six homes situated on the "Village Southbank" were flooded to a depth in excess of three feet, and surprisingly the two eastern facing ones, which were then in parish ownership, as well as the Parochial House, were not flooded - perhaps Divine Intervention?! The tide surged over the quay walls and gushed into the homes, which in any event were already

flooded due to back-up water in the shores and also a non-functional sluice. The residents were confined to upstairs and the village roadway was akin to a river. It would have been a far greater disaster but for the fact that a section of the quay wall at the western end of the estuary collapsed and farm-lands extending as far as the present-day Crompān Roundabout were flooded. This relieved the state of flooding in the village so it could be said that local rivalry was set aside for the day as Little Island played its part in "bailing out" Glounthaune! However the ever so popular, proud and most honourable Thaunies" would respond by declaring that this was only a once-off and that in any event it was a case of; "any port in a storm"! The ebb tide eased the situation somewhat but there was further flooding on the morning tide of Monday 22nd. The village was flooded on three subsequent occasions: Ash Wednesday, March 6th.1963, Saturday October 22nd.1988 and on Wednesday October 27th.2004, which in fact was the last occurrence. This is noteworthy in that flood prevention measures were carried out in 2008 and included; raising the quay wall, up-grading and modifying the shore system and connecting village homes to the main sewer. It is significant that Glounthaune Village did not encounter tidal flooding recently, or when there was widespread flooding in November 2009 or, and in particular, February 2014. The residents are heartened by this and are hopeful that the works are a success. Indeed "The Foreign Correspondent" is so convinced such is the case that should the village experience another tidal flood he will immediately discard the speedos and skinny-dip in the estuary! Those rousing and encouraging distant squeals of delight are audible! It is interesting to note that there are only two residents in the village today who resided there when it first flooded in 1962. However one of the two may be too young to recall, or perhaps confused because of the mistaken belief back then that it was bath-time! Others who resided there on that infamous occasion are now residing elsewhere in our parish and beyond, and sadly another thirty two have passed to their eternal reward; feadfaidh siad chuid eile i síochāin. The area northwards of the access bridge to the village, adjacent to the side entrance gate to the church grounds could be classified as a Drainage Basin because it is here that surface water from "The Hills of Glounthaune", replenished by rain runoff, converges. It also emanates from housing estates, such as Cois Chuain, The Highlands, and Annmount etc. where well-manicured lawns have replaced the prior to developed state of wild hedgerow and pastureland. This has reduced the soil's ability to soak up water and therefore has increased the volume that now flows towards the Drainage Basin. There is very limited planting of native trees in these estates, which is regrettable because their deep roots would provide channels to send water a greater distance underground. Retired TCD botanist Dr. Daniel Kelly



investigated restoring native oak woods and found that sessile Oak, Birch, Holly and Rowan are the chosen species to; "mend the hills and repair the streams". In past times open streams ran at each side of the roadway from the Moane Cross, past the Forge Cross and beneath the Dry Bridge as far as a cul-vert near the Church Gates. The joined streams then emerged inside the railway fencing and under the responsibility of CIE the water flow gushed down the embankment shore to another near the rail line. The greater part ran in a westerly direction from here, the lesser part easterly, for say two hundred metres and then beneath the rail line to a pond at Craigs Field and finally into the estuary. Due to flood related issues in the village the streams were piped underground circa twenty years ago; however the threat of flooding remains. For example; the flood in October 1988 was not of a tidal nature but rather because of blocked drains at the Drainage Basin and also at the western pump shore in the village. It is of course the responsibility of Cork County Council to ensure that culverts and drains are in a free condition and in this respect the council has failed miserably. When last was maintenance carried out? But it is also in the best interest of the community to monitor the situation closely and alert the authorities well in advance if any major problems are envisaged. There is no place for complacency. Follow-up action is required therefore the community has to exert continuous pressure to ensure that the matter raised is immediately acted on. Also, there is no solace derived from the fact that the authorities were pre-warned of the flood danger, moreover if one is relaxed in one of the renowned village parlours in the midst of a few feet of flood water! It is also important to work with rather than against officialdom and needless to say anger has never solved anything. The residents, as was the practice in the past, could readily attend to minor drain clearance issues on a routine basis and thereby minimise the flood risk. There was a village flood alert during the recent weather conditions when an inspection manhole at the Drainage Basin did not have the capability to withstand the abnormal volume and velocity of water. The prompt action of present and past village residents, as well as fire brigade personnel, averted the danger but such incidents highlight the importance of monitoring and also the fact that resi-dents should always be in a "Bí Ullamh" mode. The value of people's community spirit, solidarity and co-operation count a lot and in the many recently affected flood areas those shone like a beacon. There was tangible evidence of leadership and co-ordination and it begs the question; was such evident in Glounthaune? The simple answer is; "No", but hasten to add that the individual spontaneous reaction was admirable. The fact is that once again the "High Vis Jacket Troopers" were conspicuous by their absence, and engaging in photography at such a time is to say the least not very tactful or helpful. On this occasion there was flooding at the area adjacent to Fitzpatrick's Shop and O'Neill's' Public House, with both sustaining business losses due to closures, as well as the Waterside Apartments Block. It appears that the high water level in the nearby pond and the resultant water back-up in the shores was the main cause. This area was never previously flooded. It is interesting to note that the Tidy Towns' Spring Newsletter of March 2015 referred to the "Ashbourne Pond Rejuvenation"; "the pond area has been a major focus for our tidy towns' efforts. One issue over the years has been the low levels of water in the pond and significant algae growth. After significant investigative efforts by GTT; Irish Rail inspected the complex drainage system and were persuaded to excavate the drains. The removal of two railway sleepers has significantly improved the flow". There was an accompanying photograph which showed a manhole inspection with the caption: "Irish Rail inspect diversion of inflow from rail-side to estuary and ensure main flow to pond". Incidentally during the recent flood a timber board, evidently inserted to prevent water from entering the tidal estuary and thus diverting same to the pond, was located in a rail-side manhole. That is Interesting. There is an urgent need for all concerned to meet, discuss and by learning from the past; plan the way forward. Now is the time because; "Ní hē lā na gaoithe lā na scolb." THE SCOURGE OF ELECTION POSTERS

My father advised me to never bear more than one trouble at a time for some people bear three kinds-all they ever had, all they have now, and all they expect to have! However, I am troubled today and in explaining it I have a feeling that it may make me sound grumpy and bad tempered but I shall have to risk it. My problem has to do with election posters.

Gardeners, I feel, fall not only victim to every life form that creeps, crawls, flies, sucks and stings but to pests of their own kind too. When you live on a busy main road, the problem is compounded especially during times of either local or general elections. You see, I cannot after all my years, understand why anyone not living in my area (and perhaps yours) can come along and plaster the pole outside the front gate with a multitude of election posters, making the whole place look as if a circus is coming to town. Isn't every area of this country littered enough with rubbish and dirt without these adding to it? Doesn't my area get enough bad press (in relation to littering) without these enormous billboards hanging from every electric pole? Does anyone agree or am I totally alone? This kind of electioneering undertaking was fine years ago when few had television, radio, or social media but today, everyone knows who is up for election and who is seeking yet another ride on the magic roundabout.

Long before the day of reckoning arrives, who has to sweep all the torn posters when wind and rain has blown them down, and who has to eventually remove them for binning? Not always those who put them up. I certainly have to get out there time and time again to clean what has not been of my creation and it's just not good enough. Even when the posters are eventually taken down (as required) who is responsible for

the plastic ties that remain? Are we are never going to learn about litter?

The galling thing is that if I write about a government approved weed-killer for controlling some of the tougher, more invasive garden and roadside weeds, (or suggest a peat-based compost) I can be assured of a bevy of letters condemning their promotion.

In conclusion I would ask all electioneering agents to respect the rights of property owners countrywide. I prompt them like a gentle fall of snow and not like a driving storm of hail. Do not devalue residential area with posters and unsightly ties, for true liberty exists in the privilege of enjoying our civic rights, not in their destruction. And the décor and clean appearance of our streets and parks is indeed a civic right.

THE GARDEN IN FEBRUARY.

A cock's foot, by which length the days are supposed to increase during January and February is not a generous measurement, but those extra minutes of daylight every afternoon in February become a lavish hour by month's end! Short though February is, it begins in winter and ends in spring (especially here in Glanmire)) and during mild and moist spells it is easy to see life and a new greening return to the garden. Gardeners must remain vigilant of course, for winter will surely return on a number of occasions to strafe and pummel yet again. However these are the

actions of an antagonist losing ground! Victory and triumph are on the horizon and the trailers are showing in the form of snowdrops, crocus, and the earliest reticulata iris. I hope you have some of these poking up from the cold ground!

SOLDIERS AND SAILORS; As spring struggles to supplant winter, the variegated pulmonarias deserve a mention and these should be allowed grow into broad patches in otherwise untenanted ground between shrubs. One might suppose that these plants lack vigour (as variegated perennials often do) but I have not found this to be the case. The multi-leaved clumps wax fat and produce flower stems in multitudes if you let them grow as they like. Having loose morals, they are inclined to self-seed wildly, obscuring their parent lineage in the process. The flower heads of Pulmonaria saccharata (the most common form) change from pink to blue over a number of weeks and since they open successively, both colours can appear at the same time. I believe this to be the reason for their common name of "Soldiers and Sailors".

ROSES; Pruning roses is often considered a skilled job, essential and exacting if good results are to be had. For all that, the Royal National Rose Society doesn't agree and they're regarded as experts in the field of growing roses. In their trials some years ago, they simply sliced the top off the bushes about half way down with a hedge-trimmer and the results proved that the roses bloomed consistently better than

the same varieties pruned to age-old principles by the hornyhanded! The state of the hedgetrimmed bushes may look rather untidy for small twiggy stems may not produce flowers but this could be a benefit-the more leaves on the stems, even if they are twiggy, produce more energy for the plant and more blooms overall. So unless you want to produce a few long, straight stems carrying one exhibition quality bloom, this method could benefit you! Just cut back your rose bushes any day this month bearing in mind that any cut will do! Now doesn't that make rose pruning and care a little less daunting?

CLEMATIS; Prune mid to late summer-flowering clematis now going down to three feet and less in many cases. Pull down all the old shoots and discard to the compost heap. Clematis that will bloom between spring and summer should be left untouched. Be sure to give a deep mulch of manure or compost to all varieties as this will ensure the soil holds a plentiful supply of moisture during periods of summer drought.

LILIES; Source and plant lily bulbs as soon as they become available in garden outlets. Choose firm bulbs which are firm to the touch and whose scales are not falling loosely apart. Best in deep pots, plant three at a time and stand in a warm spot until top-growth is noticed. Water at this stage and begin a course of feeding with any liquid preparation with a high potash content based on seaweed.

Renewed Sponsorship Deal Hennessy's Daybreak Service Station at White's Cross has recently agreed a second term as main sponsor to the White's Cross GAA Juvenile Club. In line with the previous arrangement this once again will last for three years, up to the end of the 2018 season. In order to propel the fundraising efforts around this event, Hennessy's Service Station sponsored the White's

Juvenile AGM

The election of officers at the recent White's Cross GAA Juvenile AGM was a most straightforward process with all the outgoing officers re-elected for another term. In his address to the meeting that took place at Scoil Naomh Michéal, Upper Glanmire, the chairperson Mike O Flynn said he was hugely satisfied with the 'major improvements and major strides' made in 2015. Mike referenced the 'excellent working relationship with the adult club and officers' and said that both adult and juvenile club officers '...all have to continue working in improving player welfare in what is a never ending journey'. Mike listed some of the projects successfully completed during 2015: Astro surface laid as access route to the main pitch; Astro surface laid underneath and around car park fencing; Astro surface laid between walkway and external wall; Sanding of the main pitch with 90 tonnes of sand and verti-draining; Weed control and slow release fertiliser on the pitches; Poles erected for stop ball netting in main pitch; Additional poles erected in the juvenile pitch for stop ball netting; Four player dugouts in the process of being manufactured; Walls modified and fencing

erected to give our neighbours greater privacy and protection from balls/sliotars; Hurling wall got a makeover with 'targets' painted; Lighting installed in the hurling wall and the astro pitch areas; Landscaping and laying of grass seed in areas around walkway; Mound of earth moved beyond the hurling wall in preparation for levelling, draining and seeding; Many painting projects completed; Petrol strimmer purchased for weed and grass control.

Mike stated that there are five cornerstones that will continue to support the growth and expansion of White's Cross GÂA Club: 1. the players across the club; 2. the coaches; 3. the infrastructure / facilities; 4. the support and help within the club and the wider community which includes parents, schools and local 'and not so local' businesses and 5. the club's committees and membership. Mike said it's a case of '...drive on hard together and solidify the cornerstones' throughout 2016 and beyond.

SPEECH TO THE STUDENTS OF GLANMIRE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

On Thursday, 21st of January, Glanmire Community College had the honour of inviting Rugby World Cup referee, Nigel Owens, as a guest speaker to the school. Nigel Owens is one of the best known referees in the rugby world and in the sporting world. He has overcome many personal challenges to rise to the pinnacle of his profession, when he refereed last year's Rugby World Cup final, which saw New Zealand beat Australia in Wembley.

School Principal, Mr Pat McKelvey introduced Nigel Owens and welcomed the sporting hero to GCC. Nigel started his presentation explaining how he started out in rugby and how he always knew he was going to be a referee. Then he recounted the gloomier period of his life that shaped his personality for the two decades before his rise to the top of his profession. He spoke about growing up in a Welsh village and how he struggled to come to terms with his homosexuality at the age of 19 years. How depression, steroid abuse and bulimia blighted him.

Owens, whose tough reputation saw him chosen to referee the 2015 World Cup final, said accepting himself was the biggest challenge of his career. "The biggest challenge anyone comes across in their life is accepting who they are. I spent years and years trying to accept who I was. Only then could I get on to the next stage, which was seeking help by speaking to friends, family and even strangers. By doing that, I was able to get to where I am today and get on with my life. Getting through those challenges in his life he said "has made him who he is today. A lot of people are struggling with who they are. They can't tell other people they're gay because they're fighting it themselves".

Nigel had a final piece of counsel for the students; he told them "never underestimate how important each and everyone of you are to your friends and family, just by being you. It doesn't matter who you are, what religious beliefs you have or your sexual preference, we are all different, all unique. All that matters is that you are a decent person, and that you respect people around you and are respected. Whatever you end up being or achieving in life, give it your best shot. No one can ask anything more than this. Life is short, make the most of it, and enjoy life. The IRB World Cup Final referee was very generous with his time after his presentation, allowing plenty of photo opportunities and discussion with the students. The Management of the school expressed their gratitude to Nigel Owens for taking time out of his busy schedule, ahead of his match in Toulouse next weekend, to come and deliver such a powerful, honest and memorable presentation to the students of Glanmire Community College.

Know Your Rights

Question: I heard that the minimum wage has increased to €9.15 an hour. My employer says that this only applies to adults and that, as I am under 18, he won't be increasing my hourly rate of pay. Is that right?

Answer: No. Since 1 January 2016, the statutory minimum wage for an experienced adult has increased to €9.15 per hour. Under the National Minimum Wage Act 2000, there are also pro-rata increases for those aged under 18 and for trainees. The new rates are as follows:

If your employer is not paying you the appropriate minimum wage, you can make a complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC) using the online complaint form available on workplacerelations.ie. In the complaint form you have two options. You may either request an inspector from the WRC to investigate a claim that the national minimum wage is not being paid or you may refer a dispute to a WRC to investigate a claim that the national minimum wage is not being paid or you may refer a dispute to a WRC adjudicator. However, you can only refer a dispute if you have requested a statement from your employer outlining the calculation of the average hourly pay. You can get more information on the minimum wage and your employment rights from the WRC Information and Customer Service (Lo-call 1890 80 80 90 or workplacerelations.ie) or from the Citizens Information Centre below.

Alcohol in Pregnancy: "Even one is one too many".

Until very recently, the main message for healthy pregnancy was to encourage and support women to stop smoking. This has been incredibly successful, and 50% of mothers successfully quit smoking once pregnant. Stopping smoking has enormous benefits for the pregnancy, and newborn infant. Alcohol in Pregnancy: Did you know that alcohol in pregnancy is really toxic to the baby? A study in Dublin showed that 63% of women drank alcohol during pregnancy, and most continue drinking during their pregnancy. Pregnant women in other countries such as US, UK, Australia and New Zealand are much less likely to consume alcohol. Teenage girls in Ireland drink as much, or more, than teenage boys

Alcohol: one for the baby? The baby in your womb gets all its nourishment from its mother's bloodstream. Alcohol in the mother's blood can pass through the placenta to the baby's blood. When you drink alcohol, so does your unborn child. Alcohol is toxic, and it can poison the developing baby. The unborn babies liver cannot

handle alcohol, and it persists in the babies blood for a very long time. The amniotic fluid acts as a reservoir for alcohol, so the baby is actually immersed in alcohol. The damage depends on which part is developing at that time. The brain is continually forming for the full nine months, so it can be damaged at every stage of pregnancy. In the first three months the heart, eyes, and kidneys might be harmed. Later, when the baby is growing fast, alcohol can slow this down resulting in an underweight baby,j or stillbirth. Foetal alcohol spectrum disorder (FASD) is a group of disorders which are caused by exposure of the foetus to alcohol. The US Senate has declared FASD the leading cause of (non-genetic) intellectual disability.

What if I was drinking alcohol before I knew I was pregnant? We're unsure exactly when and how harm begins. If you are trying to conceive or feel you may be pregnant then it's best to avoid drinking alcohol. The sooner you stop drinking, the better for you and your unborn child. Regular binge drinking (more than six units of alcohol) or drinking heavily on regular occasions during the early stages of pregnancy is harmful to the unborn child, especially the developing brain.

What is the long term outlook for FASD? There is no cure so babies born with FASD will be affected throughout their lives. They are likely to do less well in school, and get into trouble more. They tend to have problems making friends. When they grow up they are more likely to get into trouble with the police and end up in jail. They might become addicted to alcohol or drugs. This is because they can't see the consequences of their action and they cannot control their impulses.

How can FASD be prevented? FASD is 100% preventable. We can avoid the physical, psychological, educational and social challenges of FASD. If you are pregnant and do not drink alcohol, you cannot have a baby with FASD. Heavy drinking and binge drinking are especially damaging to your baby. It's safest not to drink any alcohol at all. One drink is one too many. Conclusion:

• If you are pregnant or planning a pregnancy, don't drink alcohol at all.

• Drinking in pregnancy harms your baby: the more you drink, the greater the risk.

• Women who find out they are pregnant after already drinking during early pregnancy, should avoid further alcohol. Thankfully it is unlikely for most women that their baby has been affected.

I would like to thank you for the part on where you mentioned we are a superb Hotel on the doorstep but I am very disappointed with the part about the plastic glass and further more the picture of it.

Perhaps if we were asked why we had plastic glasses that night we would have had the opportunity to explain the reason and it would not have been written like it was. I fully appreciate some people may not have liked their drink in a plastic glass and yes 99% of the time we serve drinks in real glass. For that event with 800 people sitting in the ballroom it would have been a serious Health and Safety issue if we had allowed people bring glasses into the ballroom where they would have been left on the floor.

As we tried to get as many chairs as possible into the room for the event we did not have any large round or pod tables that people could perhaps leave the empty glasses on and as you might have seen all the plastic glasses were left on the floor and under chairs. If we had used real glass it could have lead to an injury where someone might have fallen or walked on a glass and received a serious injury. Thankfully there was not one incident on the night and I do believe that the plastic glasses lead to this.

For us in the Hotel we have to look at each event separately and make a decision what works for that event.

For Example we had an event over xmas for 1200 in the hotel and we were able to use proper glasses for that event as the ballroom was laid out in a way that could take it.

I just wanted to bring it to your attention that it was a little unfair I feel and something that could have been left out of the article.
