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Possible Infrastructural Improvements For Glanmire

Briefing Note to Members of the Cobh/Glanmire Municipal District

Re: Development of Lands at Dunkettle and Ballinglanna, Glanmire which are zoned for housing.

Context:

- 1. The Dunkettle Site was first zoned in the late 1990's and Ballinglana site first zoned in 2003.
- 2. Since then there have been a total of three planning applications all of which have been referred to ABP and, despite approval by the County Council, all three have been refused by ABP.
- 3. These refusal have been for a variety of rea-
- sons but most recently principally including:
- a. Poor integration of new development with existing settlement of Glanmire
- b. Adverse effect on local road network
- c. Impacts on National Road network (Dunkettle Interchange)
- 4. The previous applications were all developerled with little input to the planning of the proposals from the County Council. Following last refusal, the County Council took the view that, if development was going to succeed, there needed to be a greater input into the planning of the proposals by the County Council.
- 5. With that in mind, the County Council has carried out a lengthy and detailed traffic and transport assessment with a view to:
- a. Minimising impacts on the National Road network; b. Resolving issues on the local road network
- c. Improving the potential for integration with the existing village of Glanmire 6. That work has led to:
- a. An agreement with the TII that up to 400 units on the site can be developed in advance of the Dunkettle Interchange upgrade;
- b. A package of off-site road, footpath and cycleway other and sustaina-

ble transport measures to resolve and mitigate local transport issues

- c. These projects will benefit the housing development but will also provide wider benefits to the Glanmire area
- d. €5.9m in LIHAF Funding
- 7. Developer now intending to make a planning application to ABP in July. Intention is that the application will be supported by an

agreement under s 47 of the P&D Act 2000 with the County Council which will govern the delivery and funding of the relevant off site infrastructure

- 8. Developer now consulting with the public as part of the process of preparing an EIS to support the intended planning application.
- 9. County Council are in the process of appointing consultants to design and supervise the development of the relevant infrastruc-
- 10. County Council's part 8 process will begin

To be provided to service the needs of the 400 houses planned for the Ballinglanna lands and which could be provided in advance of the Dunkettle Interchange Upgrade:

- a) Provide upgraded signalised junction including a right turn lane at the junction of Glanmire Road and Church Hill
- b) Barring of right turn movements on the Dunkettle Road at the N8 on-slip
- c) Capacity improvement of the existing signalised junction at Riverstown Cross including

extension of the right turn

- d) Signalisation of the Hazelwood/Glanmire Road iunction
- e) Signalisation of the junction of Glanmire Road and Glanmire Bridge
- f) Signalisation of junction of East Cliff Road and L3010 at Riverstown Village
- g) Complete the link road between Hazelwood Road and Riverstown (L3010)
- h) Partial upgrade of Dunkettle Road from Glanmire Bridge to Caherlag Road i) Spine road through the
- development lands connecting Dunkettle Road to Fernwood housing estate
- j) Cycle track between Glanmire Bridge adjacent to the Glashaboy River to extend as far at the Hazelwood Road at the Community College
- k) Improved footpath linkages between the Ballinglanna and Riverstown Village

Phase 2.

To be provided to service the needs of additional 800 houses to be provide at the Ballinglanna lands and at the Dunkettle lands following completion of the Dunkettle Interchange Upgrade

a) Upgrade of Dunkettle Road from Caherlag Road to Bury's Bridge Rounda-

- later this year
- 11. CPO's will be required for land acquisition
- 12. Construction of projects not requiring land acquisition will be accelerated
- 13. Housing development and construction of remaining infrastructure projects commencing in 2018



The Sacred Heart Church

A local magazine called "Community Way" was published by the vibrant Glounthaune Youth Club back in the seventies.

An article entitled: "Know Your Church" was published in the March 1970 edition, the content of which is reproduced as follows. QUOTE: Most of us, I am sure, fully appreciate the architectural beauty of our church at Glounthaune, but I wonder how many of us know about its history, the cost of its erection, and the valuable work and generosity of the local people who made it possible. It had been recognised for some time prior to 1895 that the old church in the village of Glounthaune, on the site of the present school, was inadequate to accommodate the increasing population in the district. Therefore in 1895 it was decided to proceed with plans to erect a new church. The parish priest, Rev. Canon D. Mc Namara, and Cork architect Samuel Hynes sourced a suitable site where the church was subsequently built. On December 4th 1895; a quarry at Killaclovne was offered by Morgan O'Connell, through his agent Felix Mc Carthy, for the purpose of providing the necessary stone. One condition imposed was that the parish priest would pay one penny per ton for all stone taken from the quarry. I wonder what Wm. Ellis & Sons Ltd. or John A. Wood Ltd would charge today. On December 18th 1895; Canon Mc Namara received the lease of a portion of ground for nine hundred and ninety nine years from Sir Leslie R. Falkiner at the nominal rent of twenty five shillings per annum, which was eventually given free. A local farmer, Michael Barry, also surrendered his title to a piece of ground adjoining that of Sir Leslie Falkiner's. On December 30th 1895; twenty horses were called to commence drawing the stone from the quarry but because of weather, described as "awful with south-easterly gales and rain that was never previously experienced", work slowed down considerably. It would appear, therefore, that the weather we have experienced this past winter is really nothing new! On March 6th 1896; the architect stated that "the elaborate plans" for the church would cost £3,972.00. At a public meeting held at the old church on March 22nd; tenders were considered for the erection of a new church - they moved fast in those days! Five tenders ranging from £4,225.00 to £5,220.00 were submitted and Mr. J.J. Coffey of Midleton was the successful contractor. His price for "the whole work and material" was £4,225.00. After discussion, and some opposition, it was agreed that the farmers would pay one shilling and three pence in the pound on Poor Law

Valuation. That is what I would call; "Real Local Authority"! The first sod was cut by Rev. Canon D. Mc Namara on April 29th 1896 and the weather was more kind for this occasion. There appears to have been no rain from March 28th. to June 8th. and during

this period a temperature of eighty seven degrees in the shade was registered. In fact oats were cut at Little Island as early as July 8th. Digging of foundations commenced on May 28th when Mr. C. O'Toole was appointed Clerk of Works at the princely wage of two pounds, ten shillings per week. At this stage it was found that sand was showing in the foundations on the proposed north side of the Chancel and also at two of the Pillars. It was reported on July 6th that Mr. Coffey "was very slow with the work" - there is a familiar ring about that! By the way, workers please note, but not employers; labourer Pat Casey was paid one shilling and

eight pence per day and I don't know what was special about Wm. Barry, perhaps a foreman, as he was paid a daily wage of two shillings and sixpence. The foundation stone was laid "amid great pomp and splendor" by the Bishop of Cork, Dr. O' Callaghan on Sunday July 26th 1896 and the men of the parish walked in procession from the "Quay Church" in the village. A bottle containing a parchment bearing the date and name of the reigning pontiff, together with medals and various coins were laid in the cavity. Work was delayed considerably during the winter of 1896 / 1897 because of incessant rain from November to April. In fact it was so bad that crops were not sown until May and as a result potatoes suffered badly from blight and the crop was almost a complete failure. Eating potatoes were imported from Germany at the outrageous cost of three farthings per pound, and the price for seed potatoes was a penny, halfpenny - Present day merchants please note! So the work proceeded and the church was dedicated on April 24th 1898 and named Church of the Sacred Heart. The sermon was preached by the Bishop of Cloyne, Dr. Brown. The cost of building the church eventually amounted to £6,000.00 - you might get the sacristy built for that today and everybody, including the breweries and distilleries, gave generously. Great praise was given by the local newspapers to the architectural beauty of the church and if I may be technical for a moment: the nave and aisles are separated by pointed arches of a

high pitch springing from octagonal molded caps of Portland stone, resting on red polished granite columns and Portland stone bases. All the barge stones, kneelers, quoins and plinths are in limestone, quarried at Little Island. The belfry bell weighs five hundredweight. It was estimated, optimistically I fear, that the church would accommodate one thousand people. It is interesting to



note that a let-

ter was received from Cork County Council on July 20th 1898 accepting the site of the old church for the building of a school, but refusing to bear any costs of repairing same. Great praise is due to the ladies of Glounthaune and Knockraha who undertook to bear the cost of £280.00, plus 10% to Mr. Hynes for the design, of supplying the main altar. Mrs. Jenkins presented the altar of St. Joseph as a memorial to Mr.& Mrs. T.H. Gallwey of Glenburne. Miss Hogan of Blossomgrove donated the Sanctuary Lamp and the side lamps were donated by Mrs. Mc Sweeney of Island Cross. Sir Leslie & Lady Falkiner presented the window on the right hand side of the main altar which depicts the Annunciation. The centre window, dedicated to the Sacred Heart, was installed at a cost of £105.00 to the memory of the Very Rev. Canon John Barry and depicts Our Lord requesting Sister Margaret Mary Alacoque to encourage devotion to the Sacred Heart. Canon Barry had initiated the building of the church but sadly passed away in May 1895. The window on the left, portraying the Presentation in the Temple, was donated by Mrs. J. Murphy of Annmount. A section of the original altar rails was given by the Sisters of Charity and the remaining sections by Mr. Watson of Cork. Mr. Nicholas Murphy of Killahora donated the statues of St. Joseph and the Blessed Virgin Mary which were imported from Paris. Mr. Murphy also gave £100.00 as a contribution towards the

erection costs. The altar of the Blessed Virgin was donated by Mr. J.J. Murphy of Bellvue. "A friend" gave £100.00 for the Stations of the Cross and £28.00 for the Italian designed Holy Water Font. The two main windows at the rear of the church were donated by Canon O'Leary's relatives in 1937. The pulpit was donated by Mr. J. Murphy of Annmount to the memory of his late wife. UNQUOTE. The foregoing article was penned forty seven years ago and as a result of Vatican 11 some modifications were made to the interior of the church the following year. The pulpit which was positioned at the front left hand side of the middle aisle was removed, as were the altar rails. Incidentally; did the Vatican Council actually give such a general directive relative to the latter? The front section of the altar was detached and brought forward thus enabling the celebrant to face the congregation, and the remaining section of the altar formed a backdrop - as is today. The Baptismal Font, which was located adjacent to the northern door and encased with railings and a locked gate, was first moved to where the pulpit stood and later to its present location at the Altar of the Blessed Virgin, Also, burial arrangements were very much different than today. Two pieces of slotted timber were placed on two high trestles and positioned adjacent to the southern door and were overspread to floor level with a black pall which had a white cross on the visible side. On the night of "removal" the coffin was laid on this platform and three candles on high wooden holders were placed at either side. The funeral ceremony took place the following afternoon and did not include the celebration of mass but family members might attend a scheduled mass that morning. The priest, wearing a white "sash" over his suit, travelled to the graveside in a car which headed the hearse of the funeral cortege, and was the sole occupant sitting on the rear passenger seat. Yes, different times. The photograph shown here was taken on the day the church was dedicated; Sunday April 24th 1898. It is interesting to note that the large Crucifix, now at the right hand aisle, was not yet in place, or the pulpit which was positioned at the left hand aisle prior to removal. The only lights appear to be that of lamps at both sides of the timber Altar Rails, and the hanging Communion Cloth is notable. The timber rail preventing access between aisles can also be observed. Incidentally, some interesting Heritage Boards were erected at various locations in our area in 2013 and that near Glounthaune church contains the referenced photograph; however the caption shows April 24th 1989 as the date that the church was dedicated!

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Parden (Shades

Gardeners make good use of moveable seats. They have learned that permanently positioned seats can't follow the sun and that cold breezes have a habit of sneaking into the garden from a number of different aspects. Deck chairs may be great fun on decks, but a neat folding chair (for example)

is much more appropriate and can be used for dining outside during summer and inside during the off season. These may come in garden tolerable colours and look inviting, but nothing compares to a comfy timber seat, moveable or not!

Various redevelopments around the garden at Villa Marie has meant that garden chairs and tables are now finding new positions and to assimilate them I have lately spent the odd afternoon with sandpaper and paintbrush at the ready. Choosing and changing the colours is the best bit. I remember many years ago, meeting a keen gardening friend who opened her ravishing garden for charity on a very regular basis. She detested white garden furniture likening it to so many 'aspirins' usually plonked near to choice perennials or even on the lawn. She had just painted her most comfortable seats a cool grey and they looked absolutely delightful. Pale greens and blues were used on other sets especially those sited in sheltered, hidden areas which one had to stumble upon rather than notice from a distance. They looked so wonderful that I have followed her colour schemes ever since and I delight whenever new 'garden shades' are introduced by paint-

makers. buy You can pastel-like colours from fancy (and expensive) paintmakers or you can be canny and spot the same

thing in your local hardware shop. Many are to found in B&Q under the brand name 'Cuprinol Garden Shades'. One of the nice things about these water based paints is that you can change your mind (and outdoors furniture) every yearmore often if you like!

Even the top garden designers at this year's Chelsea Flower Show (those who created some of the most photographed gardens at the extravaganza) used similar shades of paint on all their timber garden features; gazebo's, furniture, decking, sheds, even summerhouses.

At home, you don't have to stop there! One of the best paint effects I have ever indulged in is now quite 'invisible'. Years ago, I invested in a number of galvanised wire hoops to support the floppy growth of herbaceous plants, especially dahlias and delphiniums. The instructions promised that that once in place they would be hidden in a week,

but some galvanised extrusions always seemed to be sticking up in front of the phloxes and lupins, lobelia and tall campanulas. So in desperation I bought a tin of unconventional green, sprayed the lot and I haven't seen them since!

Following our recent disappointing spring in which terra-cotta pots were fractured and shattered by late frosts I took stock of the undamaged remains and began a programme of renewal. From the illustration you can see how one of a number of large old pots was transformed from something chalky and neglected looking into a really attractive feature. It survives to this day. Needless to say it may this month of August, receive yet another change of colour.

were trundled out from their hideaways and dropped into the vacated positions. They look as if they have been growing there always.

hellebores now that their seed pods are about to open and drop their seeds. Left alone, the seed will fall and germinate in their hundreds early next spring. All will fight for light, nutrients and growing space so avoid the creation of yet more unnecessary work. Simply nip off the seedpods and you'll get an immediate smartening of the plant and its deeply divided palmate leaves. If extra plants are needed allow some pods to remain. When you consider that the 'better' coloured forms of Helleborus orientalis are sold for as much as €25 each in garden outlets it probably makes sense to save at least a few.



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THE AUGUST GARDEN

AUTUMN: The mood of autumn is already evident in the foliage of trees, shrubs, and all plant life. The shortening hours of daylight have crept in unannounced, marking yet again the ebb and flow of the seasons and of life itself. But while the dance of surrender may be obvious to those who observe these subtle changes, there are still two good months of gardening activity to be enjoyed. The garden once again becomes 'a cabinet of curiosities' for shadows increasingly deceive the eye and light play funny tricks even during a high August noontime. Now's the season in which to have an eye for detail, a love of the unusual, a collectors mentality for weird shapes, odd movements, and unexpected and sudden bursts of shortlived golden colour. If you garden with grasses and late perennials you'll have these golden treasures I

speak of, and be able to rely heavily on shape and pattern for all of autumn through to October.

POPPIES: botanically known as papavar have exploded in the warmth of a single late July weekend! They formed a red and mauve mass, tall and dignified, heads nodding sagely in the breeze like a cavalcade of cardinals at the Vatican. And it was the sheer quantity not just the variety that made this such a thrilling sight. Perhaps it was the unusual winter which encouraged such a show, but in under a week they were past their best and going the way of the lupins. This was expected of course, and in anticipation of the ugly gaps, pots of lilies **HELLEBORES**: Tidy up those spring-flowering

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



D'fhás sé aníos i measc chosmhuintir Chorcaí agus cé gur bhain sé mórán amach lena

D'fhreastail sé ar an Mainistir Thuaidh agus bhí deis aige ann a acmhainní spóirt a léiriú Bhí sé ina bhall d'fhoireann na Mainistreach Thuaidh a bhuaigh Corn an Artaigh trí bliana as a chéile in 1934, 1935 agus 1936. Nuair a bhí sé fós ar scoil, d'imir sé, chomh maith, le Cumann Naomh Nioclás sa pheil agus le Raonaithe an Ghleanna san iománaíocht. Ó 1935 anall, bhí sé ina bhall d'fhoireann Chorcaí. 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

Know Your Rights - August 2017

Question:

My partner and I are planning a holiday in Spain. How do we access public healthcare services if one of us becomes ill?

Answer:

You and your partner each need a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). This card allows you to access public healthcare services if you become ill or get injured when visiting certain European countries. It doesn't cover private treatment or the cost of repatriation to Ireland if required.

The countries covered by the card are the 28 member states of the EU, the three other members of the EEA (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway) and Switzerland. The card is not required for a visit to the UK if you can show that you are ordinarily resident in Ireland. In practice, this means showing a driving licence, passport or similar document.

If you have a smartphone you can download the free HYPERLINK "http://ec.europa.eu/social/main. jsp?catId=559&langId=en" EHIC app.This includes emergency phone numbers and information about the treatments and costs that are covered. The app does not replace the card.If you already have a medical card or Drugs Payment Scheme card, you can apply online for your EHIC at HYPERLINK "http://www.ehic. ie" ehic.ie.

Otherwise, you can download an application form from ehic.ie or get one from your HYPERLINK "http://

findaddress.citizensinformation.ie/service_finder/" Local Health Office. You need to provide your name, address, date of birth and Personal Public Service Number (PPSN). If your EHIC has expired you can renew it online at ehic.ie. If your details have changed (for example, your address) you will need to contact your Local Health Office to renew the card.

If you have concerns about getting a new or renewed card in time, you can get a Temporary Replacement Certificate, either HYPERLINK "https://www.sspcrs. ie/portal/ehic/showProv.do" online or from your Local Health Office. You may also wish to consider taking out private travel insurance for expenses that are not covered by the European Health Insurance Card (such as the costs of repatriation or the expenses of relatives who travel to you if you fall ill abroad).

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Knockraha History and Heritage Society

Mass Path Walk & Mass **In Memory Of Joe Holland**

On Sunday 20th of August the Knockraha Mass Path Walk will be held starting at Butlerstown, Brooklodge and arriving in Knockraha for 10am mass.

This year the walk will be in memory of the late Joe Holland who passed away during the year. This will be followed by 10am mass in Knockraha Church and at the request of the Knockraha History Society will be said for Joe. It was Joe who was originally able to tell us the route of the walk having often used that path as a child with his parents to walk to mass in Knockraha. Without Joe's knowledge there would not have been any mass path walk. These mass path walks go back hundreds of years in our history and would pre-date a lot of roads. When these mass paths became established people had a legal right to use them with stone stiles in place to get over fences. Some of these stiles are still there so in doing the mass path walk we are following in the steps of our ancestors. During the history of Christianity in the Knockraha-Brooklodge area we have been served by 3 churches. The first was erected by St Quane in what is now Kilquane Cemetry. This was destroved by O' Neill's army on their way to the Battle of Kinsale in revenge for the Barry family of Barryscourt, Carrigtwohill not supporting O' Neill and his Spanish invaders in the Battle of Kinsale. A small section of the walls of that church with loose stones are still visible in Kilquane cemetry. After the destruction of that church, even though they were Penal Times, the good Christians of Knockraha erected another church in Meeleen. in the North-East of the Parish, on O' Sullivan's farm. No trace of that church is visible today other than a field known as the Church Field but what was dug up some years ago was a holy water font in that field. Obviously it was part of the church and would well have come from the original church in Kilguane. This holy water font was kindly presented to the Parish and has recently been installed in the foyer of St Mary's Church, Knockraha. The present Knockraha Chruch was consecrated in 1803 and this mass path was used by people from Brooklodge to go to mass in Knockraha. For the Mass Path Walk on Sunday August 20th we will gather in Butlerstown at John Kelleher's at around 8:30am to be ready to start walking at 8:40am. The route is about 3km all through level fields and is a very scenic route taking approximately 1 hour which any able-bodied person should have no bother doing.

However the route is not accessible for wheelchairs. We should be coming on to the public road at Barry's Hill at around 9:45am and as we walk the final part of the journey towards Knockraha Church we will recite the rosary for Joe Holland. So if there are people who would not be able for the walk but would like to commemorate Joe, they could meet us

at Bary's Hill and join the rosary to Knockraha Church. There is ample parking for cars in Butlerstown at the start of the walk and after the mass in Knockraha we can provide transport for people to collect their cars in Butlerstown. This mass path walk is part of National Heritage Week when we are reminded of our glorious past. Heritage Week runs from August 19th

to August 27th taking in 2 Sundays. On the first Sunday Knockraha History Society will host the Mass Path Walk and on the second Sunday August 27th the Knockraha History Society will open Sing-Sing prison in Kilquane graveyard to the general public from 12 to 6pm. There will also be an exhibition of memorbilia from the War of Independence at the graveyard. Sing-Sing has become a major tourist attraction during the last few years. This is attributed to its importance during the War of Independence as the prison for the Cork No. 1 Brigade with over 100 prisoners being kept there during the War and with up to 30 being executed out of it. It is a unique facility with nothing similar in Ireland. It has received massive exposure from historians in various publications and it was recently the subject of a major docmentary on TV3. It is believed that the Sing-Sing structure was constructed 1500 years ago as a store for monks to hold their food and it was used again in the 17th century as a safe place to keep bodies during the body-snatching era. The structure itself is an underground vault measuring 16ft x 8ft x 6ft high in the centre. Entrance is gained by descending 6 steps. It is guarded by a solid gate with spikes and there is a strong steel door 1/2 ft thick. When the door is closed the vault is totally dark and for most of the year water drips from the roof. It now has a special interest to those studying the paranormal according to a recent book 'Haunted Ireland'. It has been suggested that there is a secret compartment at the back of Sing-Sing. It will take archiologists to explore this on Heritage Sunday. It will be open from 12-6pm with conducted tours every hour in which all its history will be explained. In tandem with the opening of Sing-Sing we will have an exhibition of memorbilia from the War of Independence such as guns including a maxim machine gun captured from the British. These were the dominant guns from the First World War. Recently the History Society were presented a Russian rifle retrieved from the Aud which was destined to be used by the Volunteers in 1916. Pat Mulcahy is preserving it in a specially-made glass case. To add to the evening courtesy of Knockraha ICA a cup of tea and light refreshments will be available free of charge. Also on display will be the equipment used by Knockraha IRA to make hand grenades which were distributed through the whole country. So all in all we have a very interesting evening promised.

The Power to Change

The Power of Purpose Part-Two

In Part 1 of this article I mentioned the fundamental importance of having a real and lasting purpose to our lives. Mention was also made of how few people manage to get any real sense of purpose, or in many other cases people have decided not to live according to their purpose.

Something that should have been mentioned previously is the alternative words we use for Purpose, namely our dreams and ambitions. It is these words that many people will relate to more easily, especially those of a younger generation. It is easy enough to say: "my dream is to..." or "my ambition is to..." etc. But how do we know if these are the right dreams and ambitions in the first instance? How can we tell whether we are living our own dreams and ambitions or whether we are compromising them in favour of what others want? Or maybe, we have suppressed them because of what others would have us do instead? The following questions can help us determine what our true purpose is or should be, had we the confidence and courage to pursue them:

What energises me the most when I talk to people about my interests, job etc., or when I talk about my dreams and ambitions?

Another way of putting this is: what lightens up my eyes and fills me with delight, and makes me want to give everything I have in order to make it happen?

After having shared my dreams and ambitions with others, am I more or less likely to betray myself and my feelings by not doing what I know in my heart is right?

Far too many of us make decisions about our dreams and ambitions, not on what we really want and know to be right, but rather on what others want from us, or, after they have undermined our dreams in some way. It is when faced with these situations that we are more likely to compromise or give up altogether and tow-the-line instead; anything not to upset them or run the risk of rejection. But how does that make us feel, really? All the evidence shows that the price we pay is far too high. By suppressing our dreams and re-

pressing our true feelings we are setting ourselves up for great disappointment, which will inevitably lead to unhappiness, depression and possibly worse.

- · Add in the sugar, and

- When the sugar is dissolved, boil the jam RAP-**IDLY WITHOUT STIRRING** for about 5-7 minutes.
- Gently stir your jam, and pour into the jars to within 1/4 inch from the top.
- Cover with wax circles at once, and put on lids, or alternatively wait until jam is completely cold. Leave to cool in tins before removing.

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
