## **UCC graduate is RTE's** chief financial officer

RTÉ has announced the appointment of University College Cork (UCC) graduate Mari Hurley as its new chief financial officer.

Ms Hurley replaces Richard Collins, who resigned from the role at the troubled national broadcaster last October. RTE said Ms Hurley, who will take up her new role in the summer, will join recent ap-

pointments to director general Kevin Bak-hurst's leadership team, including commercial director Gavin Deans and director of legal Daniel Coady.

In addition to being a UCC graduate, Ms Hurley has completed the executive management programme at the Harvard Business School in the US.

She was previously chief financial officer for AA Ireland, Lotto operator Premier Lotteries Ireland, Hostelworld Group plc, and Sherry FitzGerald Group.

Ms Hurley also has non-executive board ex-perience with two of Ireland's leading semistate bodies. She is currently a non-executive director of the National Asset Management Agency (Nama) and until 2021 held a similar role at Ervia. She has served as chairwoman of the audit and risk and credit and remuner-ation committees with both bodies.

Commenting on her new role, Ms Hurley said she was "delighted" to be joining RTÉ and its leadership team at what she described as "this critical time for the organisation and for

the future of public service media in Ireland". "I look forward to working with the director general, the RTÉ board, its audit and risk com-mittee, and the finance team to develop RTÉ's financial strategy," Ms Hurley said, "and to bring my experience of successfully leading and implementing change and transformation programmes to RTÉ, in line with the unique

values and obligations of public service." Kevin Bakhurst said Ms Hurley was a highly experienced CFO with extensive experience in setting and driving the strategic direction of global businesses.

## **Health Check highlights Glanmire potential**

Cork City Council, Glanmire Area Community Association, and Glanmire Chamber of Com-merce recently launched the findings of a new Health Check report on the area

The Health Check, which was The Health Check, which was funded by the Department of Rural and Community Develop-ment and Cork City Council under the Town and Village Rene-wal Scheme, was launched on Thursden grouping at the Clen Thursday evening at the Glan-mire Church Parish Hall. The report found that Glanmire

has the potential to strengthen as a town and develop as an area with improved liveability.

The results of the research car-

ried out as part of the report provided recommendations on how to reduce the dispersed nature of the Glanmire area, creating an identifiable town centre.

The report found that Glan-mire's vibrant community and distinctive built heritage have been fundamental to the identity of Glanmire and will require sig nificant consideration in achiev ing a more distinctive town centre for the community.

It also identified Glanmire's dispersed commercially focused areas as a matter that must be addressed in identifying a centra-lised town centre for Glanmire.

The report also found a need to undertake a wider assessment of existing social and recreational infrastructure and to identify suitable locations for such infra-structure to meet the demands of

Glanmire's growing population. A number of major regeneration projects and initiatives are currently being progressed in Glanmire

These include the Glanmire Flood Relief Project and the de-livery of 15 projects under the Local Roads Improvement Scheme. The findings of the Health Check will assist in identifying what other initiatives are required in developing an overall planning framework for the Glanmire area

Cork City Council thanked the Glanmire Area Community As-sociation (GACA), Glanmire Chamber of Commerce, elected members from the North East Ward Cork City Council electoral area, staff from Cork City Coun-cil, and the residents of Glanmire for their input and support in the report

Cork City Council also thanked Wessel Vosloo and his team from The Planning Partnership who carried out the research and fina-lised the report.

### Cork campaigners host 21st Palestine rally today

The Cork Palestine Solidarity Campaign (CPSC) is set to hold another rally for Palestine in Cork city centre today.

The demonstration marks the 21st rally by CPSC in Cork since Israel's war on Gaza commenced in early October.

CPSC co-chairman Martin Shiel condemned the Israel De-fence Forces (IDF) for the deaths of 112 people in Gaza on Thurs-

day, where it is claimed the IDF opened fire on crowds of Palestinians at a food-delivery point. "Desperate Palestinians in the

besieged north of Gaza had been starved of food deliveries by the IDF for more than a week," he said.

"When it was finally permitted, the food delivery became a scene of slaughter and death. The kill-ing cannot be allowed to continue. We await condemnation of this slaughter by our Government and we demand that the Government work much harder with those try-

"It's also way past time for the expulsion of the Israeli ambassa-dor and for an end to trade with Israel

Workers' Party leader and councillor for the Cork North East ward Ted Tynan condemned the killing of civilians who were trying to collect food aid in Gaza.

"More than 30,000 Palestinians, including over 13,000 children, have been killed since the beginning of Israel's genocidal war on aza," he added. Mr Shiel called on people to join Gaza

the march and rally today "to express their outrage at the escalating carnage in Gaza". It will commence at 1pm at Grand Parade.
